Government Seeks Automobile Mechanics

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examination for the position of General Automobile Mechanic.

Where to obtain application: Full information as to the requirements for these examinations, and application forms, may be obtained from Frank E. Carlson, secretary of the local Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners or, Recorder, Labor Board, U. S. Naval training station, Great Lakes, Ill., or, The Manager, Seventh U. S. Civil Service District, Post Office Building, Chicago, Ill.

Duties of position: The maintenance, overhaul, and repair of all types of motor vehicles used by the Navy Department, involving the operation of electrically operated lathe, grinder, drill press, shaper and milling machine, and to perform related work as required.

Basis of ratings: This examination requires no written test. Applicants will be rated on the quality and quantity of their experience and fitness, on a scale of 100.

Age limits: Applicants must have reached their 20th birthday, but must not have passed their 48th birthday on the closing date for receipt of applications specified at the head of this announcement. The age limits do not apply to persons granted military preference because of military or naval service, except that such applicants must not have reached the retirement age.
