

MRS. W. W. RAMSEY TO ADDRESS LEAGUE MEET

H. P. Women Voters To Hear State Vice-President December 18

Mrs. W. W. Ramsey, vice-president of the Illinois League of Women Voters, will be the speaker appearing before the regular monthly meeting of the League of Women Voters on Wednesday afternoon, December 18, at 1:15 at the Y.W.C.A.

Her subject is "The League in Action at Springfield," covering what the League hopes for in the way of state legislation, at the same time touching on bills to come up before Congress. She will indicate the hurdles in the process of a bill passing the legislature, and forecast measures the League expects to support. Personal experience will help to illustrate, and since Mrs. Ramsey has always done things, her talk is bound to be interesting.

Born in Pennsylvania, Mrs. Ramsey claims she was always a suffragist, but from her Quaker ancestry

and feminine presence, one can guess it was never of the militant type. Her father was the editor of a leading newspaper which advocated the enfranchisement of women, and from an early date the father and daughter discussed together questions of the moment.

Back in 1921, Mrs. Ramsey attended the first Citizenship School given by the Illinois League and obtained a diploma, having successfully passed the test given at the end of the two weeks' period. Today Mrs. Ramsey is one of the most popular conductors of League Citizenship Schools and is ever in demand as a speaker. Besides being a close student of civics and education matters she has the gift of presenting a somewhat complex subject in simple and easily assimilated form. Her poise, charm, friendliness, and frankness greatly increase the effectiveness of her work.

For many years Mrs. Ramsey chairman of the Illinois League's Committee on Nominations and Elections, and was extremely instrumental in securing Cook county's adoption of permanent registration. Recently she was introduced to the Union League club as "the woman who knows the most about permanent registration in Illinois." Her knowledge is the result of actual participation in political party activity and civic organizations, and there are not many organizations interested in government that have not had Mrs. Ramsey's name on their letterheads at some time in their history.

These boys have to rehearse three times a week and strict attendance is required of all thirty-six of them so many awards are necessary. Good behavior won a ticket to the Ice Hockey games last year. Boys are always being trained to take the places of the older boys as the ages are from eight years to fourteen years.
