### Officer Richardson Ordered To Report For Duty In Navy

Police Officer Wilson Richardson has been notified to report for serv- ice in the Airplane branch of the U. S. Navy, shortly after the first of the year. Richardson is a War- rant officer and an expert in load- ing bomb racks on bombing planes.

Because he believes that no one in civil service should suffer in his seniority or retirement plans, Mayor Frank Ronan is taking steps to pro- tect the rights of these men who are called for emergency service in the National Defense program, by seeking the cooperation of legisla- tors from this district.

The Mayor plans to ask the assis- tance of Senator Ray Paddock and Representatives Nicholas Keller and Thomas Bolger in getting legisla-

tion identical to the bills approved for civil service employes who served in previous United States wars.

Acts to protect the rights of Civil Service employes so that their time ran concurrently with the time served in the army or navy, were put into force during the Spanish American and World wars. Mayor Ronan is in favor of similar legisla- ture in our present crisis.
