Too Many Dobbins Made Hitching Posts Of Trees

Landscape designers of southern Illinois can tell a sad tale of horses and trees and efforts to beautify Harrisburg in the year 1881. It seems that trees planted along the city's highways in those days had small chances of surviving because they were commonly used for hitch-

ing posts, according to an account noted by the Illinois Writers Project, W.P.A.

To the farmer in town for shopping, a tree was just a tree whether it was in the middle of a field or along a city street, and in his judgment a tree always served well as a hitching post. Unfortunately, old Dobbin enjoyed munching the leaves, and the halter around the tree trunk wore down the bark. Consequently many beautiful trees were either stunted or killed.
