The volunteer chief also issued a special appeal to all the citizens to cooperate with his fire department, as its work is very often hampered by calls of non-members of his department who wish to know the location of a fire. This produces nothing but a series of busy signals when the volunteer firemen try to telephone to find out where the fire is, with the result that the fire has burned itself out before the firemen can get a telephone connection to learn where it was. Chief Englund expressed the hope that all persons desiring to know the location of a fire wait at least 15 minutes before calling, so that all members of the volunteer department may secure the necessary information as quickly as posible.

Second it was learned that Fort Sheridan is installing three sirens that sound just like the one in Highwood, with the result that when the first one was tried out, more Highwood firemen than Fort Sheridan firemen showed up at the fire.


