

Real Estate Board Appoints National Defense Committee

President A. M. Landaker of the Evanston-North Shore Real Estate Board has appointed a special committee to cooperate with the government in the National Defense program.

With the increase in personnel of military establishments in the Chicago area and especially at Curtiss Air Field, Fort Sheridan and Great Lakes, the problem of finding temporary and permanent quarters for new men and officers is quite acute, and the Evanston-North Shore Board, through the new committee,

will make a survey of available places.

The result of this survey will be placed at the disposal of various commandants, so that the new men can find locations convenient to their posts without undue delay.

In addition to the housing facilities the Board will make a survey to discover places which might serve as headquarters for local draft boards or other emergency organizations, and will also make a survey of vacant stores where windows might be used for patriotic displays.

Owners who have vacant or furnished house which they will place at the disposal of service men are being asked to communicate with members of the Board.

Nels M. Hokanson of Hokanson & Jenks, Inc., has been appointed chairman of the new committee and other members are: Robert L. Wyatt, E. Sawyer Smith and Howard Brown.

League of Women Voters To Entertain New Congressman

Newly elected Congressmen from Illinois are to be interviewed by members of the Illinois League of Women Voters during the next week with a view to informing them on measures in which the League is interested, it was announced by Mrs. George G. Bogert, state president.

Information about the League will be given them together with the League's desire for further improvements in the administration of the federal civil service system now that the Ramspeck bill is law. Representatives will also be told of the League's opposition to the so-called Equal Rights Amendment and of its support of suffrage for the District of Columbia.

Christmas Seal Committee Plans Final Seal Sale

Mrs. Austin H. Niblack met with her Christmas Seal committee in the office of the Lake County Tuberculosis association in the Court House, Waukegan, Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 11. Plans were made for the Seal Sale during the remainder of the Holiday season. Booths will be made available for those who were missed through the mail or wish additional seals during the Christmas mailing rush. Also, seals may be obtained from the office of the association.

Great appreciation was expressed for the sale of Christmas Seal Health Bonds in connection with the regular mailing of Christmas Seals. The bond sale has been very successful, and the members of the Christmas Seals Sale committee who mailed bonds to their friends with a special plea for their acceptance were quite grateful for the good response. A still greater amount will be received as only half of these letters have been heard from.

The response to the regular letter is good. On December 11, the total for all letters, regular \$2 letter and bonds, was \$6,108.93. The committee is pleased not only for the money received, but for the expression from these faithful givers of their interest in the work of the association.

Questions have been asked the committee as to the allocation of the money received from the Christmas Seal sale. Five per cent goes to the National association much of which is spent in research in the disease of tuberculosis. Seven universities in the United States are carrying on research supported by the sale of seals. The results of all research is available to the county associations and the county sanatoriums.

Fifteen per cent goes to the State Tuberculosis association. Again, a great deal of this comes back to your local association. The State association assists the local association with its educational program, provides literature in the interest of tuberculosis for public distribution, and helps formulate plans for the growth of your county program. It is able to give invaluable information as regards the experiences and statistics of other counties and states.

The remainder, 80 per cent, is spent in Lake county, supporting clinics, nursing service, school tuberculin testing and educational publicity; all in an effort to assist in the eradication of tuberculosis from Lake county. Other much needed programs will be added from time to time as the funds from the Seal Sale increases.

The yearly report of the association is enclosed in all letters mailed out, and it is the earnest desire of the Seal Sale committee, that the recipients of these letters give these reports a close study.
