

### Ravinia School In Christmas Program Thursday-Friday

On Thursday evening, December 19th, the annual carol singing will be held in the Village House of the Ravinia school. **BREAD STUFFING**  
(For Chicken)  
4 cups bread cubes, toasted  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning  
2 tablespoons melted butter or chicken fat  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 slightly beaten egg  
1/4 teaspoon minced onion  
1/2 cup boiling water  
Mix ingredients together lightly, blending thoroughly. For a dry, crumbly dressing, water may be omitted. For a moist dressing add 2 teaspoons baking powder to prevent soggy.

**OYSTER STUFFING**  
(For Turkey)  
1 pint oysters  
8 cups bread cubes  
1 slightly beaten egg  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon celery salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
Wash oysters thoroughly. Mix ingredients together, lightly but thoroughly.

**ORANGE STUFFING**  
(For Chicken or Duck)  
3 cups dry bread cubes  
1 cup diced raw apples  
1 cup orange juice  
2/3 cup seedless raisins  
4 tablespoons melted butter  
4 tablespoons sugar  
Salt and pepper.  
Mix ingredients together, lightly but thoroughly. If moisture is needed, add a little hot water.

**PRUNE AND APPLE STUFFING**  
(For Chicken or Goose)  
3 cups bread cubes  
1 cup cooked apples (pared, diced and stewed)  
1/2 cup cooked prunes  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1/4 cup melted fat  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
Mix ingredients together, lightly but thoroughly.

### Helps for Holiday Menus

#### Stuffing News

A bird on the table is worth two on the wing—especially when it has come out of the oven browned to a turn, crackling and fragrant with the inviting promise of tender, well-seasoned stuffing within. Stuffing does its part not only by adding flavor but also by absorbing juices and keeping the fowl moist and shapely during roasting.

Bread for stuffing is best when a day or two old, and broken or cut into small pieces. For a special flavor, toast the cubes lightly. Only enough liquid is necessary to hold the seasoned bread cubes together without packing. Fill the cavity about 3/4 full, taking care not to pack the bird too tightly. Extra stuffing, for those who like stuffing with gravy, may be baked in a separate dish. Extra stuffing can be remarkably helpful in making the turkey or chicken "go" as far as possible.

If, from choice or pocketbook limitations, the traditional holiday roast needs to be small serve dressing in stuffed chops, beef or veal birds, or stuffed shoulder. Tomatoes, cabbage leaves, or small squash make fine containers for stuffing, too.
