

Announce Plans For Second Semester At Deerfield School

Immediately after vacation, during which the teachers of the Deerfield Grammar school will be visiting their homes, plans will be made for the program for the second semester. These plans call for a careful summary of the results of first semester tests and individual plans for children on this basis, real consideration of the social studies program, and further development of the

field of English.

Boys and girls do not develop at the same rate of speed just because two children are in the same grade. There is no reason to suppose that they will be in the same place in either Arithmetic or English or social studies or physical or mental growth. For this reason the school of the present day is faced with the job of offering enough individual work in grade rooms to meet the needs of the various ability levels of the children. This "individualism" of the program is one of the most important tasks facing schools at the present time. The Deerfield

Grammar school is working at the present time to meet this individualism as completely as possible.

In the field of social studies the teachers during the second semester will work on the test of developing a social studies arrangement which will serve as a center of interest and subject matter development for other subjects.

The development of these programs will be gathered by staff and committee meetings which will be held several times each week in the after-school hours. Also various phases of this program development is carried on in cooperation with the other elementary schools in this area and in connection with the program of the Highland Park High school.

Each phase of development is an attempt to make the program of the school fit more closely to the needs of the children today in terms of their present development and in terms of their high school and post high school needs.

At the present time there are approximately 600 schools in Illinois, using buses for the transportation of children, the Illinois Automobile club says, so watch out for them!

TENDER MADE HAM WITH "BELLS ON"

Connect the "bells" with a ribbon" made of angelique or citron. Use candied cherries for the "clappers." Baste the remainder of the pear bells with currant jelly and serve them around the ham.
