

Young Woman Is Killed In Crash On Green Bay Rd.

Miss Janet Stonelake, 18, of 362 South avenue, Glencoe, was instantly killed early Friday morning in an auto-truck crash in front of 1637 S. Green Bay road. A coroner's jury Friday afternoon absolved both drivers of blame when they returned a verdict that the young woman's death was accidental.

Miss Stonelake and her sister, Ellen, accompanied by Norman Durment, 366 Central avenue, were riding in the car of William D. Mann, Jr., 21, of 218 N. Sheridan road. The car was headed south on Green Bay road and skidded into a truck owned by the Deerfield Produce company, as Mann apparently did not see the truck in time to avoid hitting it. Miss Stonelake, who was riding in the back seat with Durment, was instantly killed as the right rear section sideswiped the back of the truck. The side of the car on which

she was sitting was practically sheared off.

Seth Turner, 28, of 615 Deerfield avenue, driver for the Deerfield Produce company, had parked the car at the curb while awaiting Sol Shapiro, 1637 S. Green Bay road, owner of the market, who was to accompany him to the market in Chicago.

Durment, Mann and Miss Ellen Stonelake sustained minor cuts and bruises. The body of Miss Stonelake was sent to her home town, Wadena, Minn. She is survived by her parents, Arthur and Ida Stonelake, of that village.
