

### CHRISTMAS ACTIVITY IN HIGHLAND PARK

Choir To Present "The Christ Child" at 4:30 P.M.

Highland Park's Christmas festivities came to a close Tuesday afternoon when the doors of the Community House were thrown open from 4 to 6 o'clock for an old fashioned "open house" with carol singing, Christmas music and a reception in the Williamsburg lounge around a wassail bowl and Christmas tree.

Carol singing, led by the Highland Park Music club, was participated in by those present. A program of Christmas music was presented by the Community Orchestra. Christmas cakes and punch were served in the lounge on the first floor.

Sunday evening, Highland Park citizens turned out enmasse to attend the dedication of the children's Christmas tree, and carol sing, which was held in the park near the Public library. It was a very impressive ceremony, as it was the first real community Christmas gathering held in Highland Park for many years.

Choirs from the Highland Park Presbyterian, Trinity Episcopal and Bethany churches choral societies, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, marched from four directions to the Christmas tree, singing carols.

As this was a practically new venture for Highland Park those in charge are to be complimented upon its success. Although the affair lacked coordination to some degree, it was very well done and a credit to Highland Park.

The big Christmas party which is given each year by the American Legion and Community Chest, was Monday afternoon in Community Center. The afternoon's program began with a turkey dinner, followed by a program of sound movies, carol singing and a brief talk by Rev. Suhr, pastor of Zion Lutheran church. The 90 children present each received gifts, candy and fruit.

Monday noon the Highland Park Rotary club were hosts to 16 youths at luncheon and a Christmas party.

Monday evening, the Kiwanis Club of Highland Park held a Christmas party at which gifts of toys were exchanged which were later collected and presented to the Community Center for distribution.

Sunday afternoon the Ridgewood Park association held their annual Christmas party at which 150 guests were entertained. The affair was held in the adjoining home of the Peter J. Webers and the Harry B. Aiston's on Ridgewood drive.

The Sunset Park association held a Community sing around a Community Christmas tree placed on one of the islands at the entrance

to the park. Santa Claus arrived during the singing of carols and after addressing the children distributed stockings filled with candy to the children.
