Make corn meal mush and pour it into a greased pie tin. When cool, cut up like a pie.

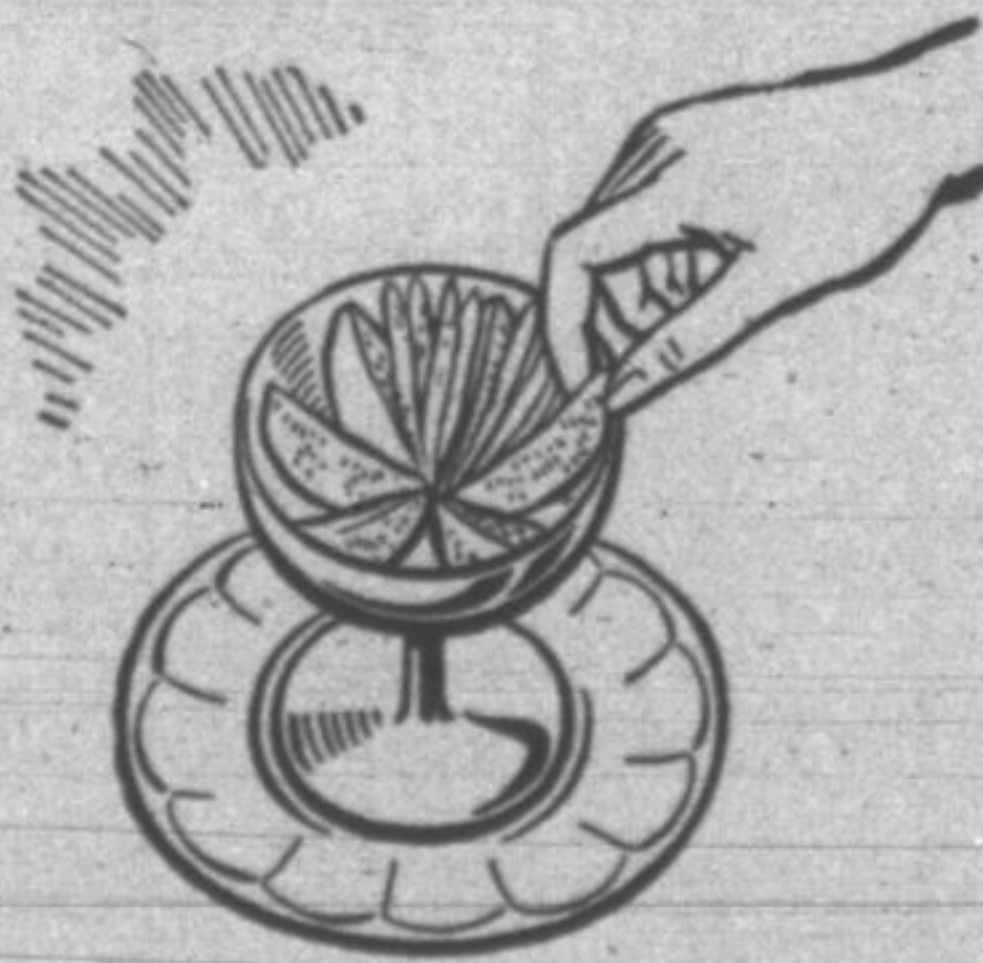
