Athletic Dep't in Fire Station
Last week the Community Center took over the old fire station from the city, and work is already in progress to transform it into a new athletic unit.

The game room will be shifted from the lobby of the Community House to the ground floor in the front of the station, giving twice as much room for this activity. The present game room will be used for a library.

The rear section, which is high-ceilinged, will contain a four-walled,

well-lighted court for squash, handball, badminton, and volleyball, with a small visitor's gallery.

The second floor will be used as an exercise room, and will contain equipment for this purpose, a locker room, and showers.

Next Saturday the directors are planning a clean-up bee to improve the appearance of the station with a minimum of expense.

Although the athletic department will be available to various age groups, it is designed particularly to meet the needs of out-of-school young men and older men, and corresponding groups of women. It will be developed as rapidly as public response justifies. Annual memberships will soon be made available, which will include all facilities for a moderate membership fee.

Junior Crafts Class
A junior crafts class, an outgrowth of the Christmas crafts class, is now being organized under the direction of Miss Dorothy Ben-

nett. The class is to meet weekly on Wednesday afternoons. The membership is limited to 20, as this is all the crafts shop will well accommodate.

All types of simple crafts work will be undertaken, such as leather work, metal work, felt sewing, and some wood work.

Ansel E. Smith Passes Away In Waukegan Friday

Ansel E. Smith, former Highland Park business man, and justice of the peace for 27 years, died Friday at Lake County Tuberculosis sanatorium, following an illness of six months.

Judge Smith as he was familiarly known was 55 years old, and was born in Wausau, Wis. He came to Highland Park in 1910 and opened a tire shop in conjunction with a Newspaper agency. In 1921 he founded the Central Insurance Service, which he successfully conducted until 1936, when he sold it.

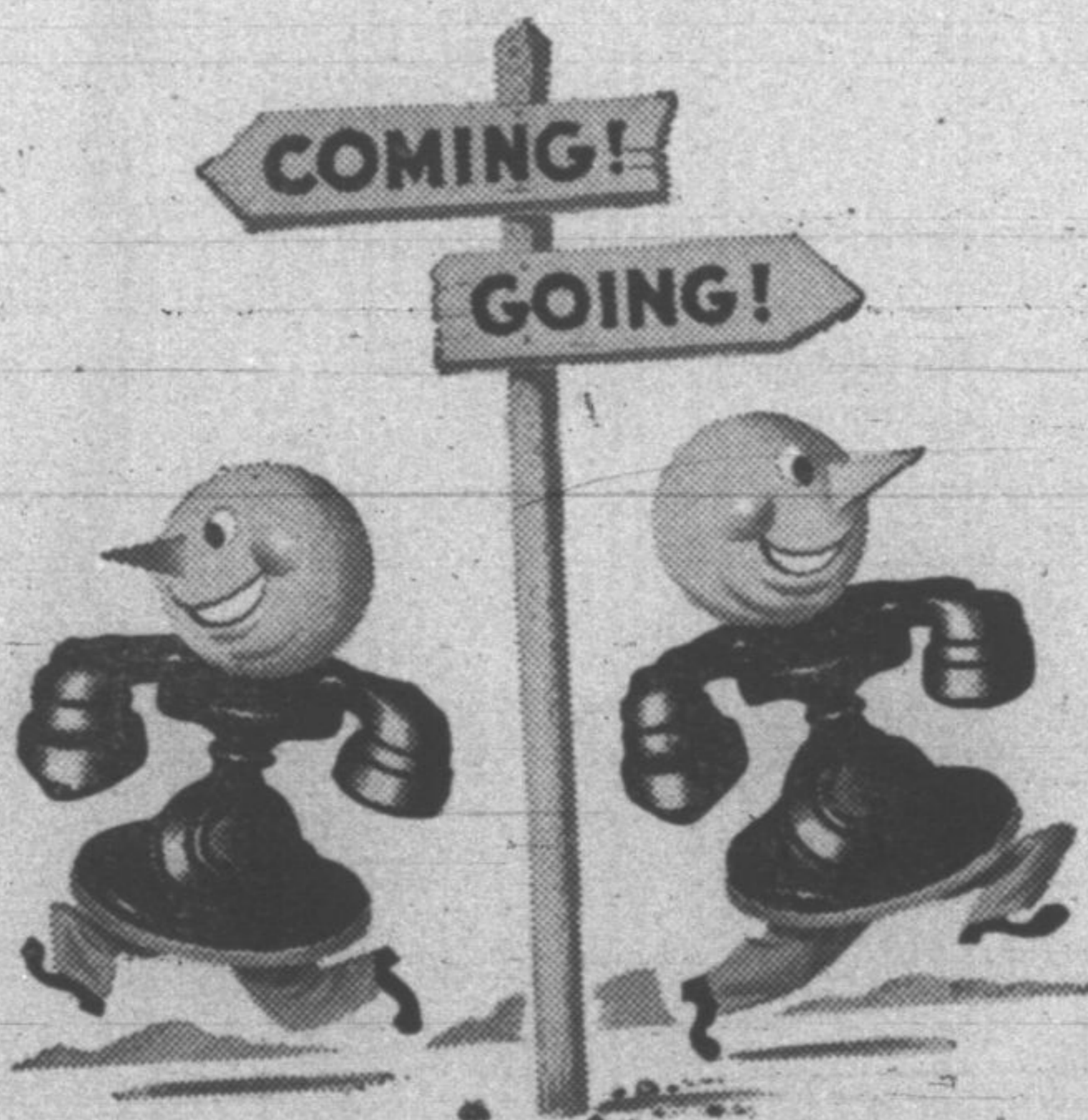
While he was actively engaged in business in Highland Park, he became a valuable member of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce. He was also a member of the Masonic lodge, Elks lodge and Lion's club. It was during his year as Exalted Ruler of Highland Park lodge No. 1362, BPOE, that the membership of this group reached a peak of 800.

For the past three years, Mr. Smith had resided in Waukegan, at 407 Cory Ave.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in a Waukegan funeral home. Burial was in Ridgewood cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Louise, two daughters, Bette Lou and Barbara Ann, a sister, Mrs. William Forelich and a brother, Raymond Smith, both of Milwaukee.
