CITY OF HIGHWOOD FIRE ORDINANCE

Passed: Jan. 3, 1941. Approved: Jan. 3, 1941. Adopted: Jan. 3, 1941.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Highwood County of Lake and State of Illinois:

SECTION 1—ORGANIZATION. That there is hereby created and organized in and for the City of Highwood Lake County, Illinois a Volunteer Fire Department to be composed of the following personnel. Chief Fire Marshal and such assistants and members as the Mayor and City Council may hereafter provide not to exceed fifteen (15) active members including officers.

SECTION 2—CHIEF FIRE MARSHAL. The Chief Fire Marshal shall be appointed annually by the Mayor, by and with the advice and consent of the City Council at the first council meeting in May, or as soon thereafter as may be.

SECTION 3—DUTIES OF CHIEF FIRE MARSHAL. The Chief Fire Marshal shall have complete control and command over all persons connected with the department, and shall possess full power and authority over its working organization, government and discipline. He shall be responsible to the Mayor and City Council for the personal and general efficiency of the department.

SECTION 4—REPORTS. He shall be present at the First Council meeting in January and shall submit to the Council the following reports, Fire alarms responded to, the amount of damage, valuation of buildings and property involved and the amount of insurance carried on same, during the past year, the amount of firemen's salaries, amount of chemicals used, price of equipment furnished, cost of gasoline and oil, cost of upkeep of equipment.

SECTION 5—REPORTS. He shall devise forms and methods of keeping records of all alarms, fire losses, school of instruction, drills, inventory of all equipment, apparatus maintenance, per-

sonal injuries to fireman and civilians and such other records as may be deemed necessary from time to time. He shall be responsible that all above records are properly kept.

SECTION 6—MEMBERSHIP. The active membership of the department shall consist of no more than fifteen (15) able bodied male citizens of the City of Highwood including officers, all of whom shall have resided in the City of Highwood at least two (2) years before making application in the said department. The applicant must be twenty-one (21) years of age and no more than thirty-five (35) years of age.

SECTION 7—ORGANIZATION OF PAID OR FULL TIME DEPARTMENT. In the event of a paid or full time department being established in the City of Highwood the members of the then existing Volunteer Department shall, as far as possible become members of said Paid or Full time Dept. Men to be appointed to same according to seniority or the eldest active members in years of service in the Highwood Volunteer Department.

SECTION 8—DEPARTMENT EQUIPMENT. The Fire Department shall be equipped with such apparatus and accessories as may be required from time to time by the Chief Fire Marshal and City Council. All equipment and apparatus of the Fire Department shall be safely and conveniently housed in such buildings as may be designated by the Chief Fire Marshal or City Council.

SECTION 9—APPROPRIATION OF TWO PER CENT TAX. All corporations, companies and associations not incorporated under the laws of this state and which are engaged in the City of Highwood in effecting fire insurance shall pay to the Treasurer of the City of Highwood for maintenance, use and benefit of the Fire Department the sum of two (2) per cent of the gross receipts received by their agencies in the City of Highwood and such funds shall be turned over by the Treasurer of the City of Highwood to the Treasurer of the Highwood Volunteer Fire Department, when the said treasurer of the Highwood Volunteer Fire Dept. shall have qualified as provided by law as such treasurer and such funds shall be disbursed for the maintenance, use and benefit of the Fire Department.

SECTION 10—INSPECTION OF BUILDINGS. The Fire Chief Marshal is hereby authorized, empowered and required to cause inspection from time to time, as deemed necessary, all buildings and premises within the City of Highwood. He shall serve notice upon all property owners for the removal of all fire hazards that may be found thereon. For the purpose of inspection, members of the Fire Department are hereby empowered to enter any and all buildings and premises at any reasonable hour. In private dwellings such inspections shall be restricted to basements and cellars.

SECTION 11—CONTROL OF BUILDINGS AND PROPERTY DURING FIRES. The Chief Fire Marshal shall have complete control and command of all fires and of the premises and property affected thereby and adjacent thereto. He is thereby vested with power and authority to enter any and all buildings affected or threatened by fire in the performance of his duties. For the purpose of fire extinguishment, all members of the Fire Department are empowered to enter all buildings in the performance of their duties.

SECTION 12—BURNING OF RUBBISH. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to burn trash, lumber, leaves, straw or any other combustible material in any street or within thirty (30) feet of any wooden or frame building.

SECTION 13—FIREMAN'S EQUIPMENT. Every member of the department shall be furnished by the City of Highwood with suitable badges and fire fighting clothing consisting of rubber coat, boots and fire helmets and such other items of equipment as may be deemed necessary from time to time. Any member who shall lose or willfully destroy the same shall be required to pay the cost of replacing said item or items and whenever any member shall leave the department he should immediately return all equipment in his possession to the Chief Fire Marshal.

SECTION 14—DUTY OF OFFICER IN CHARGE OF FIRES. It shall be the duty of the officer in charge at the time of the fire to keep a list of the members of the Fire Department who are in attendance at the fire; also the actual time that each member of the fire department gives attending each fire, and shall further give to the City Clerk such list of names and the time of each member, such list shall be preserved by the City Clerk and presented to the City Council for action.

SECTION 14-B—COMPENSATION. Members of the Department shall receive the sum of two (2) dollars for the first hour or fraction thereof and the sum of one (1) dollar for the second hour or fraction thereof and every hour thereafter for responding to any alarm.

SECTION 15—TRAFFIC CONTROL. The Fire department shall have the right of way at all times when responding to alarms of fire over all traffic and it shall be the duty of all persons driving other

vehicles, to draw to the right hand curb of the street, and come to a complete stop until after all fire apparatus has passed. Automobiles or other vehicles, unless conveying firemen shall not follow said apparatus. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or place any vehicle closer than four hundred (400) feet from the place of any fire or fire apparatus. No person shall drive any vehicle over fire hose except on specific orders from the Chief Fire Marshal or his assistants and then only with due caution.

SECTION 16—PARKING AT FIRE HYDRANTS. No person or persons shall park any vehicle of any description or place any material or obstruction within twenty-five (25) feet of any fire hydrant.

SECTION 17—HINDRANCES. No person shall hinder, resist, delay or refuse to obey fireman while acting in the discharge of their duties at a fire.

SECTION 18—EXCLUSION OF NON EMPLOYERS. It shall be the duty of all members of the Fire Department to prevent all persons not belonging to the department from entering any house or handling any apparatus belonging to or under the jurisdiction of the Fire Department.

SECTION 19—POLICE POWERS. All members of the Fire Department are hereby constituted special Police and are with all powers and duties of the regular members of the Police Department while acting as Firemen.

SECTION 20—REMOVAL OF PROPERTY. The Chief Fire Marshal or his assistants in command, shall have power to cause the removal of any property. When it shall become necessary for the preservation of such property from fire, or to prevent the spreading of fires or to protect adjoining property.

SECTION 21—COMMANDEERING AUTOMOBILES. Firemen responding to alarms for duty at fires shall have power and are hereby authorized to commandeer any automobile of any citizen to quickly transport said fireman to the scene of the fire.

SECTION 22—PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND BUSINESS HOUSES. Decorations: No inflammable materials or decorations at any time.

Exits: No less than two (2) well separated exits (doors not windows) and none less than three (3) feet wide. Where capacity exceeds one hundred (100) persons, provide a five (5) foot emergency exit with double doors and no mullion, and more than one such exit if capacity warrants. In general the total width of exit space should approximate five (5) feet per hundred persons. Capacity may figured at the rate of six (6) square feet of floor space per person. Exits should be well separated, accessible and in plain view.

Exit Doors: All doors used for exit must open outward. Doors used for emergency exits to be equipped with approved panic bolts, which permit doors always to be opened from the inside by slight pressure on a bar, though normally locked from the outside.

Exit Signs: Emergency exits to be designated by a red light or red lettered sign.

Fire Extinguishers: At least one (1) of the 2 1/2 gallon soda acid type.

Other Hazards: Heating equipment and electric wiring to be properly installed and place to be kept clean and free from rubbish.

SECTION 23—PENALTIES. Any person or persons violating the provisions of sections 12, 15, 16, 17, 21, or 22 of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than two (2) dollars nor more than one hundred (100) dollars.

SECTION 24—REPEAL. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 25—EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
