Her playing has been described as "glittering," "spectacular," and "full of Roman candles."

Behind such music one might expect a personality equally fiery and tempestuous, but as a matter of fact, Miss Mildner is quiet, shy and self-effacing. Blonde and clear-skinned, she looks more like a high school girl than a mature concert artist.

Questioned about herself, she is apt to shrug her shoulders diffidently and remark, "there is nothing to say." In the winter she finds little time for pursuits other than the piano. In summer, she says, it is a little different. Then she swims, drives her car, and takes walks in the woods with "Dollie," her Schnauzer puppy.

COMMUNITY CONCERT TO BE PRESENTED

H. P. Music Groups In Program at Woman's Club

Two Highland Park music groups announced this week their plans for a joint community concert to be given at the Highland Park Woman's club on Saturday evening, Feb. 8. With a chorus and orchestra there will appear several soloists in classical and modern music.

This occasion will mark the first appearance together of the Community Choral club and the new Community orchestra. The program, according to Mrs. Edgar Jenkins of the choral group, will feature the first performance of a song-suite from the modern opera "The Dead City" by Erich Korngold, arranged by the conductor of the Community orchestra, Everett L. Millard, especially for mezzo-soprano Mary Alan Hokanson, a former Highland Parker who will make her debut here on this evening.

The major work of the program will be Bach's "popular" and rarely heard: "Coffee Cantata," with soloists, orchestra and chorus directed by Professor Louis Palmer of Lake Forest college. The curiously named and charming music of this cantata describes a girl's love for coffee-drinking and her father's attempt to cure her by forbidding her to marry.

"In this concert there is material of real musical importance," Mrs. Jenkins added to the announcement. "We sing and play for our own enjoyment, but we do not copy stale programs and pieces heard often on the radio. If a community is really appreciative of music, it should also make its own music. When community music is vital and interesting, the listener enjoys a spirit from it that the polished professionals do not give."

Soloists of the evening will be Helen Taylor, pianist; Peggy Esmin Breakwell, violinist; Mary Alan Hokanson, mezzo-soprano; Dorothy Westbay, soprano; Kenneth C. Bennett, tenor, and Daniel Wheeler Cobb, bass.
