

Highwood Council Takes Action In Recent Soldier Case

In view of the recent beating of a soldier following an argument over a cab fare last Thursday, the Highwood council's meeting on Friday night was given over mainly to the discussion of this affair. Immediate revision of the ordinance was ordered granting the mayor

power to take action against cab drivers who cause trouble through their employers. This revision will not correct the damage already done, but it will prevent similar occurrences in the future.

The mayor expressed his regret over this incident at the meeting, and army officials are withholding the quarantine they threatened on Highwood until the outcome of the cab-drivers' trial.

One thousand dollars was again transferred from the garbage fund to the general fund, so that the officers might receive their salaries. Although Simpson Calzia and Bork opposed the payment of the salaries to the police force, Alderman Cowgill pointed out that under the present circumstances it was impossible to cut the police force and warned that additional men may be needed.

The council also approved a contract with the Matheson Alkali

Works of New York to supply chemicals for the water plant during the coming year, and received and filed a letter from the state health department stating that Highwood water is safe for drinking purposes, free from contamination and complimenting the city on the neat and sanitary appearance of its plant. The letter was sent by C. W. Classen, chief sanitary engineer for the state.

Fire Chief Arthur Englund reported that 30 calls had been answered during 1940, with actual property loss valued at \$1,207.

City Engineer James Anderson III has been asked to contact Ira Sharp, WPA supervisor, in regards to obtaining government funds for the installation of a sanitary sewer on Clay street. Although Anderson stated that WPA funds would be approved only where the public defense was concerned, Highwood officials are hoping that because the street is closely related geographically with barracks being built on the south end of the fort, funds would be allotted to them because it would also benefit the health of those in the garrison.

L. F. Academy Meets Culver Friday P. M.

Lake Forest academy will act as host to the Culver Military academy basketball team on Friday, January 24. The varsity basketball game will start at 8 p.m. in the academy gymnasium, and the Culver team will spend the night as guests of the academy. This will be the third Mid-West Prep Conference game of the season. Lake Forest academy has already played the Park school of Indianapolis, and Elgin academy of Elgin, Ill.
