Plan To Improve Beauty and Safety Of Skokie Highway

Improvement in the appearance of Skokie boulevard and safer driving conditions there are among objectives of the North Shore Property Owners association for 1941, Marion T. Martin, president, said today.

In cooperation with other agencies, the association will urge better lighting for the boulevard, more adequate signs and lights at intersections and a plan for beautifying the entire highway, Mr. Martin announced.

Increased public safety, prevention of blighted areas, better zoning laws and continued protection of residential streets from permanent truck routes are among other aims of the association which is in its ninth year of activity in behalf of the residential character of the North Shore.

The organization is expanding its membership this year, Mr. Martin said, to maintain adequate representation for the entire area which has seen 878 new homes built in the last two years. The shore line suburbs from Evanston to Lake Bluff inclusive makes up the association's territory.
