Authority on Recreation Speaks at Directors' Supper

John R. Batchelor, formerly field representative of the National Recreation association, spoke before the board of directors of the Community Center at their supper meeting Sunday evening, Feb. 2.

Mr. Batchelor stressed the value of recreation by a community, both as to the physical and mental benefits to individuals of all ages, and the wholesome effects of teamwork and sportsmanship. He pointed out the growing importance of recreation due to the increase of leisure time, and the value to a democracy in learning to work and play together. The play instinct, being a primary one, must have an outlet, and if constructive expression is denied it, effects destructive to society must be expected. Success of a recreation center depends on a program, organization and leadership.

Mr. Batchelor congratulated the directors on the progress they have made in this direction on the prospects for the future.

Fifty-six attended this meeting, which was the first supper meeting. The committee in charge consisted of Mrs. George R. Jones, program chairman, and Mrs. Tom R. Wyles, Mrs. Thomas Marks, and Mrs. F. C. Norenberg, who had charge of supper arrangements.

During the evening members and friends also visited the remodeled athletic addition to the center.

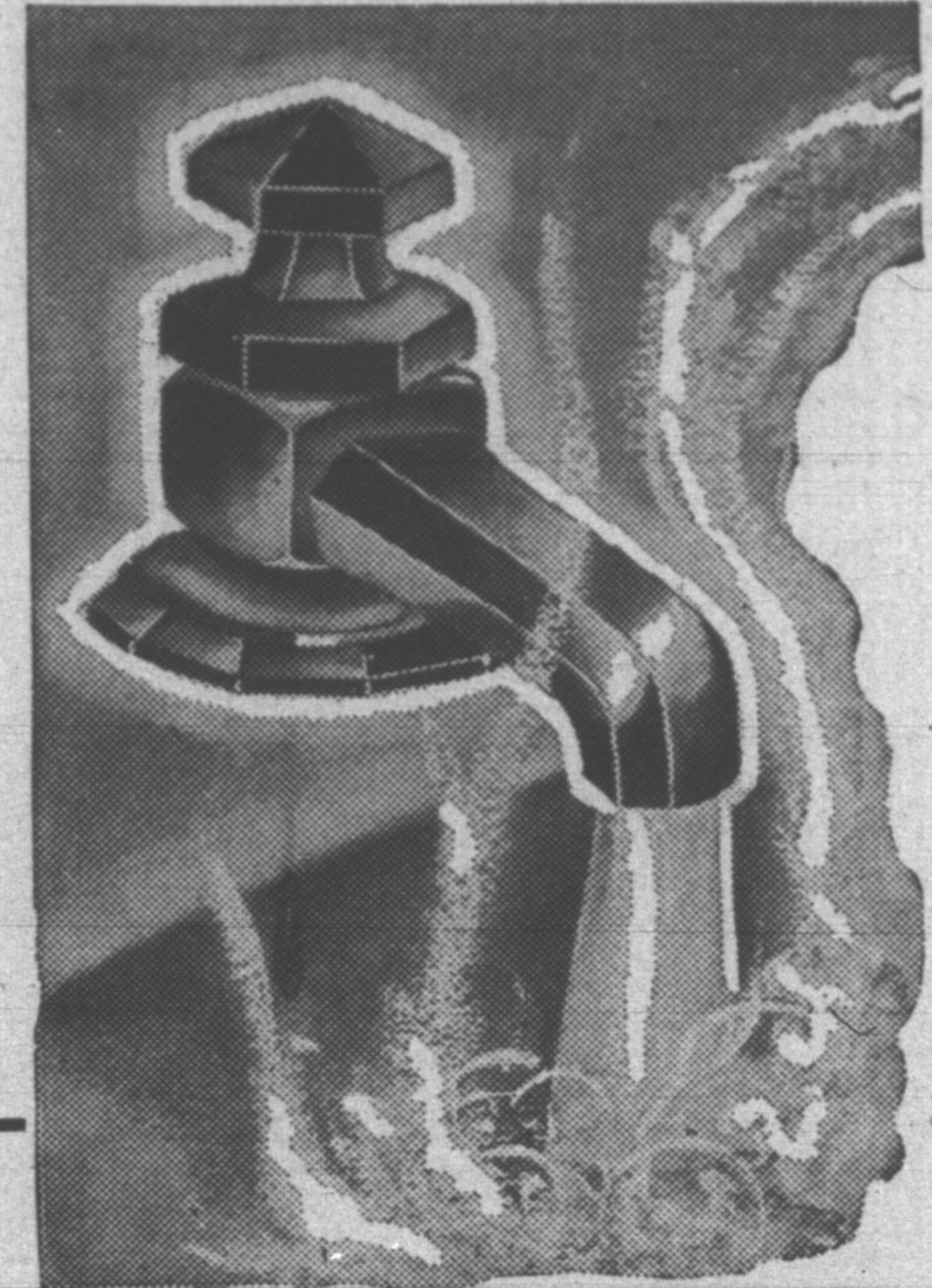
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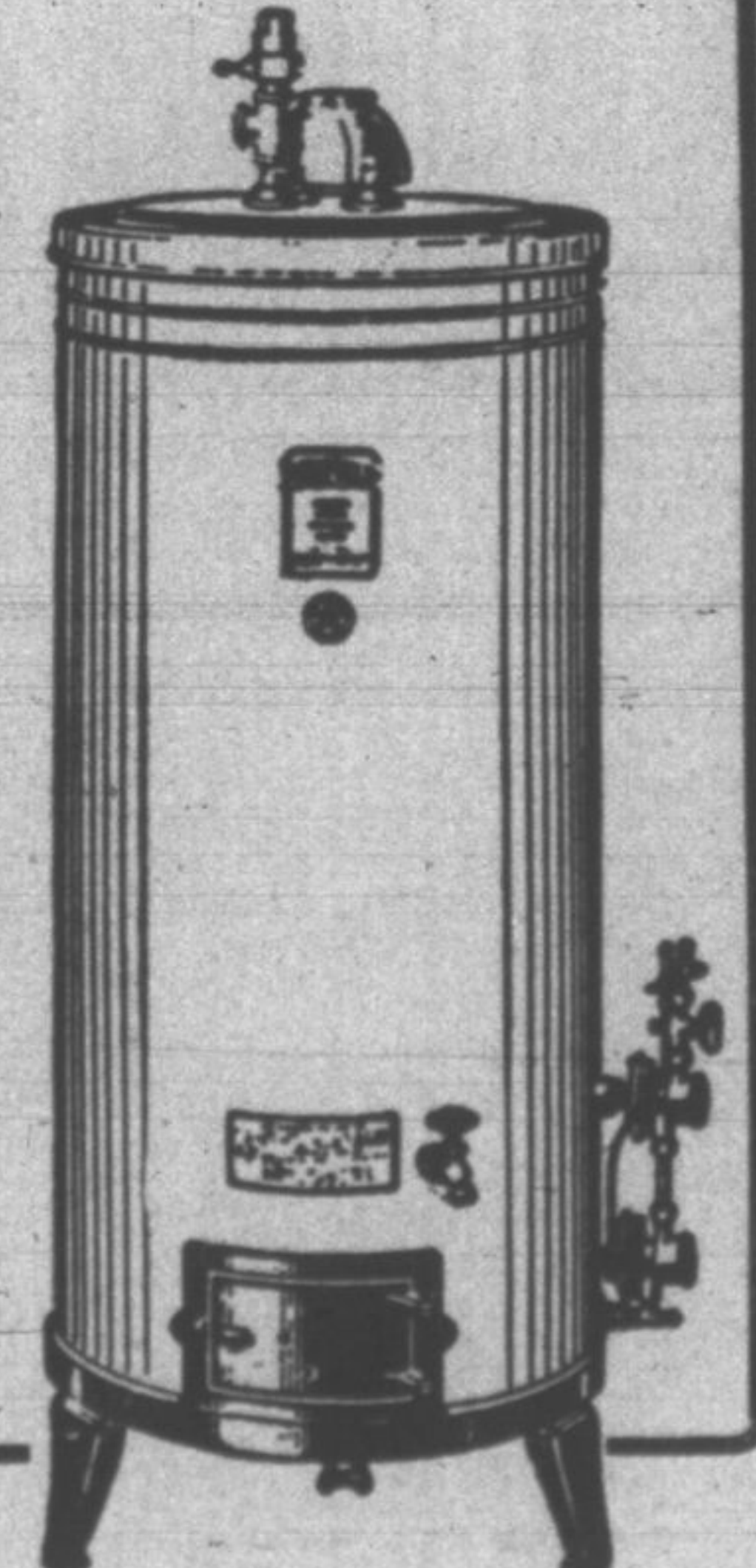
