"Recreation for School Children" Topic at Elm Place School

The P.T.A. Board of the Elm Place school is presenting Mr. Clifford Shaw Wednesday evening, February 19, at the auditorium of the Elm Place school. His subject is "What Can Highland Park Do About Recreation for Its Schoo! Children?" With reference to this topic Mrs. J. Sigurd Johnson, president of the Board, says: "This subject comes at a particularly significant time in the community history. The recent realization of our Community House and the acquiring of the property on Sheridan road across from the Elm Place school are projects both based on recreation and have opened our eyes to the possibilities of recreation within our own grasp. NEW TRAFFIC CODE FOR HIGHLAND PARK

Committee Presents Completed Draft To Council Monday

One of the original objectives of the present administration, and the Citizens Safety Committee was realized Monday evening, when after months of survey and fact finding by a special committee under the direction of Edwin Gilroy, chairman of the Citizens Safety committee formal presentation of the completed draft of a new traffic code was made to the city council by Mr. Benjamin F. Lewis, chairman of the General Codification committee and past mayor of Highland Park.

More than four years ago the Citizens Safety committee was originally sponsored by the Dumaresq Spencer Post of the American Legion to promote the need for more modern safety measures in the community. One of the first facts determined was that the city had no real means of accomplishing enforcement due to the fact its ordinances were almost obsolete.

An immediate effort was made to bring about a recodification by the committee and as a result of a number of other valuable safety measures and improvements accomplished the Highland Park Community Chest assumed the sponsorship of the safety program. ANNUAL MUSICALE AT WOMAN'S CLUB

Helen Bickerton and Raymond Koch in Joint Recital February 18

The music department under the chairmanship of Mrs. Eugene F. Englehard will present Helen Bickerton and Raymond Koch in a joint recital program at the annual musicale on February 18, at 2 o'clock. Raymond Koch, whose successes in opera, oratorio and on the concert platform have been most notable, is American born and American trained, the latter at the hands of the most eminent vocal pedagogues.

His rich powerful voice has won enthusiasm in all his many appearances. In addition to innumerable recitals in the large musical centers and principal smaller cities of the country, Mr. Koch has scored triumphs as soloist with the major symphony orchestra-the New York, Chicago, Minneapolis, Cleveland, St. Louis, etc. His recital programs are planned for the equipment of his audiences, and his explanatory remarks before each of his songs prove most enlightening.

Mr. Koch is considered a master of oratorio, that most difficult syle of singing, which requires dramatic interpretation without the assistance of costume or scenery, but solely by voice color and facial expression. He has sung over one hundred performances of the "Messiah" and "Elijah," and is famous as an interpreter of the latter.

Raymond Koch has made concert and oratorio appearances throughout the United States; toured with the American quartet and Charles Wakefield Cadman; been staff artist for N.B.C. and C.B.S.; as well as leading baritone in the light opera companies of the celebrated comedian DeWolf Hopper.

Helen Bickerton, wife of Mr. Koch, has also made outstanding successes in radio, concert, opera and oratorio. She is possessed of a soprano voice of beautiful quality with warm color, capable of brilliant climaxes. Frederick Stock chose her to appear with the Chi-Symphony orchestra and chorus in Pierne's "The Children of (Continued on Page 20)
