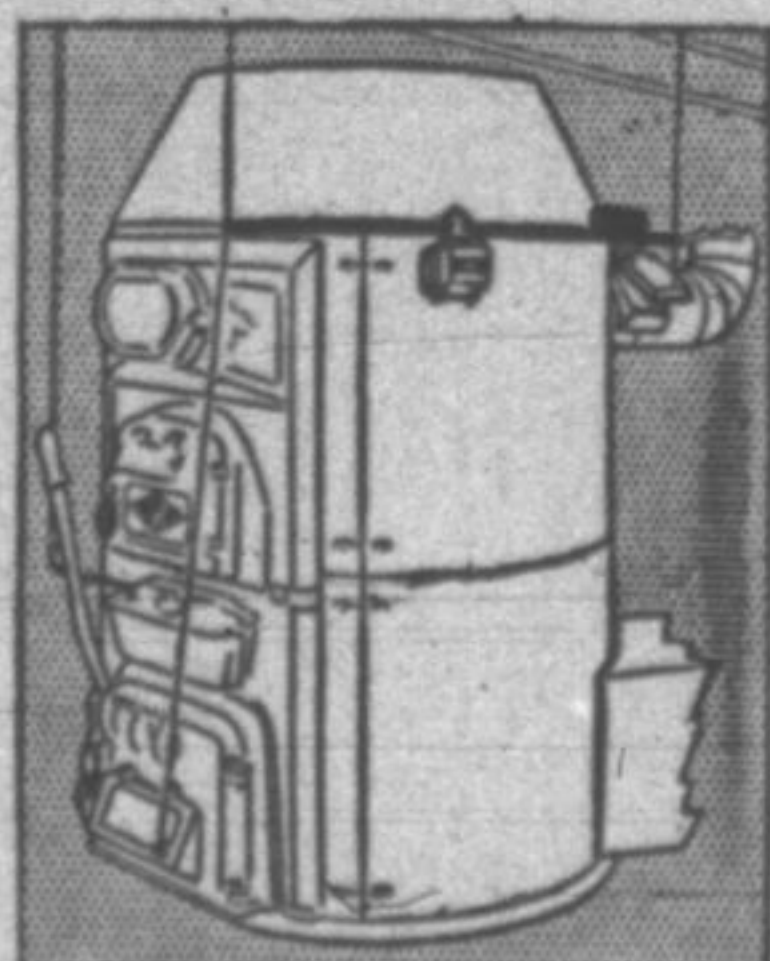

### Hold Scout Leaders Appreciation Dinner

Approximately 500 Scout, Cub and Sea Scout leaders and their friends will meet at North Shore Congregational Israel in Glencoe next Monday night for the annual meeting and Scout Leaders' Appreciation Dinner. Dr. Preston Bradley, pastor of the People's Church of Chicago, is the principal speaker. Two North Shore men will be recipients of the Silver Beaver Award for distinguished service to boyhood in the territory of the North Shore Area Council. These presentations will be made by Mr. Henry Fowler, the Council Commissioner and Chairman of the Silver Beaver Committee. The Tribute to Lord Robert Powel, the founder of the Boy Scout movement and the Chief Scout of the World, will be made by Mr. Wm. E. Webster of Libertyville. Troop 42 will put on a tableau entitled "A Scout Is Helpful." One of the principal guests of the evening will be Mr. C. J. Carlson, head of Scouting in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan.

### Many Pubic Agencies Ready To Assist In Highway Conditions

North Shore citizens desiring to improve safety and other conditions on and along highways will find a number of public agencies ready to help them, Marion T. Martin, president of the North Shore Property Owners association, pointed out today.

Local municipal officials, county and local zoning boards, the state highway department, and the Chicago Regional Planning association are among public bodies interested in highway and community improvement Mr. Martin explained. He suggested that citizens endeavor to report highway, safety and other matters directly to the proper authorities insofar as possible in order to prevent confusion and to attain more speedy results.

Lack of information on the part of the public as to what agency has jurisdiction over matters in question is one of the difficulties of the present situation Mr. Martin said. To illustrate, he cited present surveys being made to improve safety and other conditions on the Skokie road boulevard. The state highway department and local authorities in general have jurisdiction over paving, lighting, and other factors relating directly to the right of way itself but conditions off the right of way fall under the jurisdiction of several agencies he revealed.

"South from the Cook County-Lake County line the Skokie road boulevard passes through areas under the jurisdiction of Cook county, and the municipalities of Northbrook, Glencoe, Northfield, Wilmette, Skokie and Lincolnwood," Mr. Martin said, in commenting on a survey now being made by the association to help improve safety and other factors on this highway.

"Structures, signs or other developments that citizens may regard as undesirable are under the authority of the officials in the areas named. Zoning regulations are now in effect in both Cook and Lake counties affecting areas outside corporate limits and in nearly all the municipalities on the North Shore. They will afford an effective way of checking possible violations and also offer a practical means whereby unfavorable conditions can be prevented."

State, county and local officials have promised thorough cooperation in every possible way that they can to improve safety on Skokie road boulevard and other highways, Mr. Martin reported. The county zoning board has four men patrolling areas under its jurisdiction so that violations of the zoning laws may be observed and dealt with promptly.
