Handicraft Display At Woman's Club

The Art exhibit for this month at the Highland Park Woman's club is a handicraft display from the Milwaukee W.P.A. handicraft project. This project produces originally designed craft articles for use only in tax-supported institutions. Eighty-five percent of the articles are distributed to schools for display to the art classes.

A group of unemployed young designers with previous art training create the designs for all of the articles produced while some 300-3,000 unemployed workers who have had no previous art training execute the designs.

The project was started in 1935 and is considered an important one as it gives these workers an opportunity to associate with articles of taste and discrimination hitherto unknown to them; it puts a value upon creative design by producing only original articles; and it considers design and craftsmanship of equal importance.

This exhibit was collected from the articles so produced and is being loaned all over the country to stimulate interest in creative design and craftsmanship and a better appreciation for well designed articles. Mrs. Clarence J. Bassler, chairman of the Art department of the club, personally went to Milwaukee to secure this outstanding exhibit for the club to enjoy.
