School Elections To Be Held April 12

All School Districts To Vote in Annual Contest:

Annual school elections will be held in Highland Park, Saturday afternoon, April 12th. Polls will open at 12 noon and will close at 7 p. m. the same day.

In District 105, the high school district, there is only one candidate for election. George T. Rogers, whose term expires, is seeking reelection. Polls are located in the Highland Park high school auditorium, at the Oak Terrace school in Highwood and the Town Hall, Deerfield.

In District 107, there will be no opposition in the election to be held Saturday, April 12. The incumbent president, Francis M. Knight, is unopposed. Herman A. Zaeske is a candidate for re-election and Mrs. Irene M. Joselyn, has also filed for membership. The terms of Mr. Zaeske and Mrs. Roderick MacPherson, expire this year. District 107 includes Green Bay Road school and Elm Place school. Polling place will be at the Elm Place school.

The annual school election of school District No. 108 for the purpose of electing a President and two members of the Board of Education will be held on Saturday, April 12, 1941. The polls will be opened at 12 o'clock noon, and close at 7 o'clock p. m. the same day.

Petitions have been filed for John B. Jackson, present incumbent, for President of the Board of Education; for Jess Halsted, present incumbent, Motrimer Singer, and Maurice A. Pollak for members of the Board of Education.

District 108 has been divided into two precincts. Precinct No. 1, polling place at the Lincoln school, S. Green Bay Road and Lincoln Avenue, Highland Park, Illinois. Precinct No. 2, polling place at the Ravinia school, Roger Williams Avenue and Dean Avenue, Highland Park, Illinois.

The District has provided for electors who expect to be away from home on election day to vote absentee ballots, which will be provided by making application to George L. Vetter, Secretary of the Board of Education, 495 Lincoln Avenue, Highland Park, Illinois.
