

Popular Radio Trio On Legion Program

Dumaresq Spencer Post
Presents Noted Women
April 24 at Woman's Club

The International Ladies, famous radio trio, will be presented at the Highland Park Woman's Club, Thursday night, April 24, under the auspices of Dumaresq Spencer Post of the American Legion.

The International Ladies are on the air every Sunday at 3:30 over Station WAAF, Chicago. Their program is one of comment, reminiscence, and interpretation of the news, developed like variations played upon a theme, by three women who have known and seen life in many lands.

The speakers are Blanche Mason Tellis, Mary Shakespeare McWilliams, and Princess Marina Wolkonsky.

Mme. Tellis is an American writer and newspaper woman of distinguished family, who has spent many years in Europe. She presents the American point of view. Her husband is a Russian nobleman. Her childhood was spent in Highland Park.

Mrs. McWilliams is a talented writer and comes of a famous old English family, a collateral descendant of the great William Shakespeare. Members of her family are prominently connected with the present British government. Her husband is an American.

Princess Wolkonsky is a Russian lecturer whose family name is older than Imperial Russia. She resided in France for many years. She expresses her own opinions drawn from unique personal experiences and observations.

The International Ladies will discuss recent world events. The intention of their program is to show that people of all races—no matter what their background or upbringing—have certain fundamental interests in common.
