

Col. Homer Promoted To Brigadier General

Col. John L. Homer, commander of Fort Sheridan, has been made a Brigadier general. The recommendation was made to the Senate by President Roosevelt, and the promotions came through last Saturday. Col. Homer, was in Chicago at corps headquarters when the news of his promotion arrived at the fort. Lieut. Col. Fred Doring, post executive officer, arranged a welcome at Fort Sheridan while the colonel was returning there. On returning to the fort, Col. Homer found the 1,600 members of the 61st regiment lined up as a guard of honor.

The colonel was given his first 12 gun salute as a brigadier general. After military honors were paid to his new position, the company adjourned to the officers club where a reception was held.

General Homer, 52, has been in command of Fort Sheridan since December 15. He graduated from West Point in 1911. He is the commander of the 61st coast artillery (anti-aircraft) and the 40th brigade. He is married, and lives in quarters along the lake at the fort. Mrs. Homer is noted for her grace and charm, and is a perfect hostess. She fills the role of commandant's wife to perfection.

Record Vote Cast in School District 108 Election Saturday

John B. Jackson was elected president of School District 108, by one of the largest votes ever cast in this district. The large vote cast was attributed to the fact that two polling places were established for the election, to meet the needs of a rapidly growing population in the south end of Highland Park. The polling places were at the Lincoln School and the Ravinia School. A total of 709 votes were cast in the two districts, against 35 cast last year.

Jackson who was unopposed for the presidency received 557 votes. Maurice Pollack and Jess Halsted, were successful with 442 and 421 votes respectively. Halsted was elected to succeed himself.

Mortimer Singer, a third candidate for election to the board received 183 votes, while Stuart Miller, an independent candidate, backed by residents of the Ridge School area, received 122 votes.

A very light vote was cast in the election Saturday in School District 107. Francis M. Night, who was unopposed for President of the Board was reelected for another term as was Herman A. Zaeske, who also was a candidate for reelection. Mrs. Irene M. Joselyn, a new member was elected to the Board.

Two hundred and twenty two votes were cast in the High School election, District 107, to reelect George T. Rogers to the Board. A meeting of members was held last evening for the purpose of electing the officers of the Board.
