Need More Workers In Local Red Cross

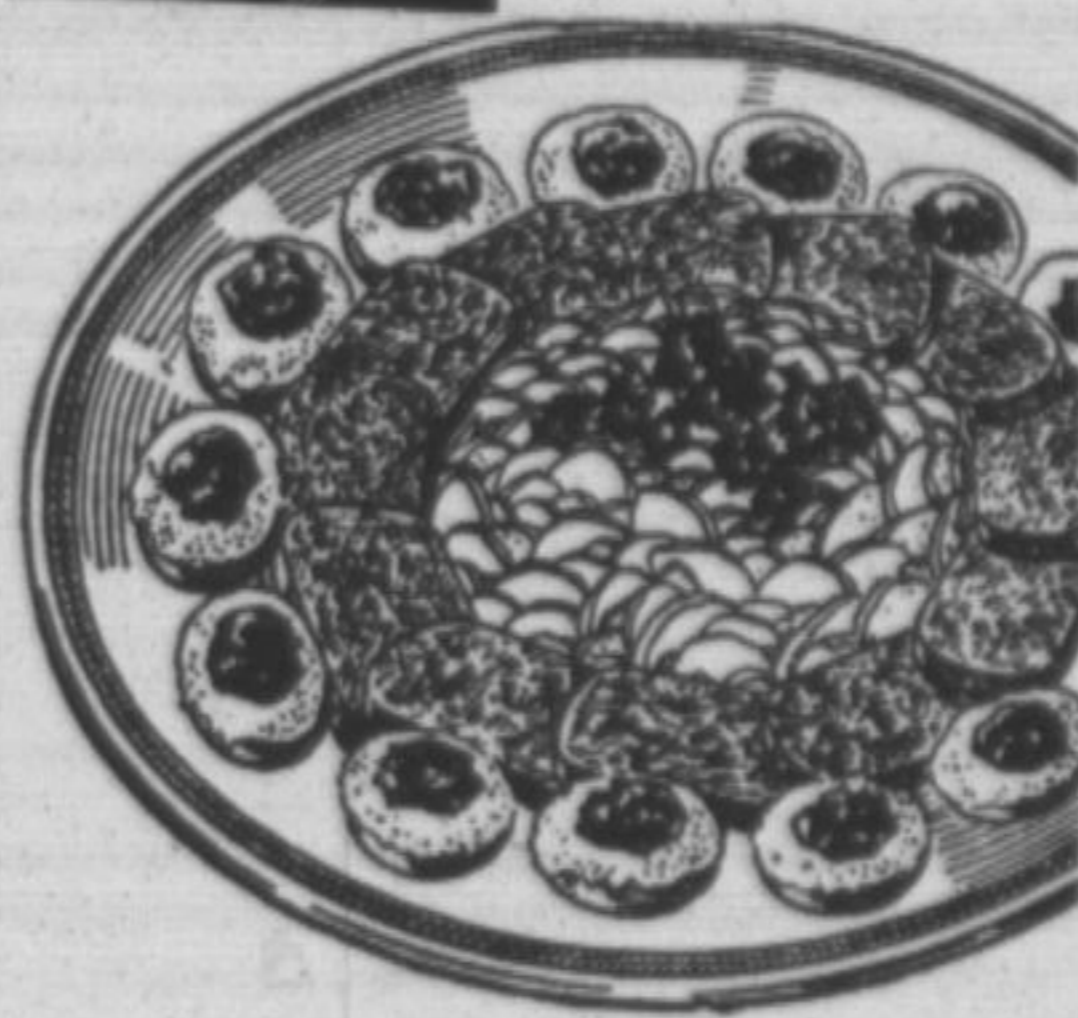

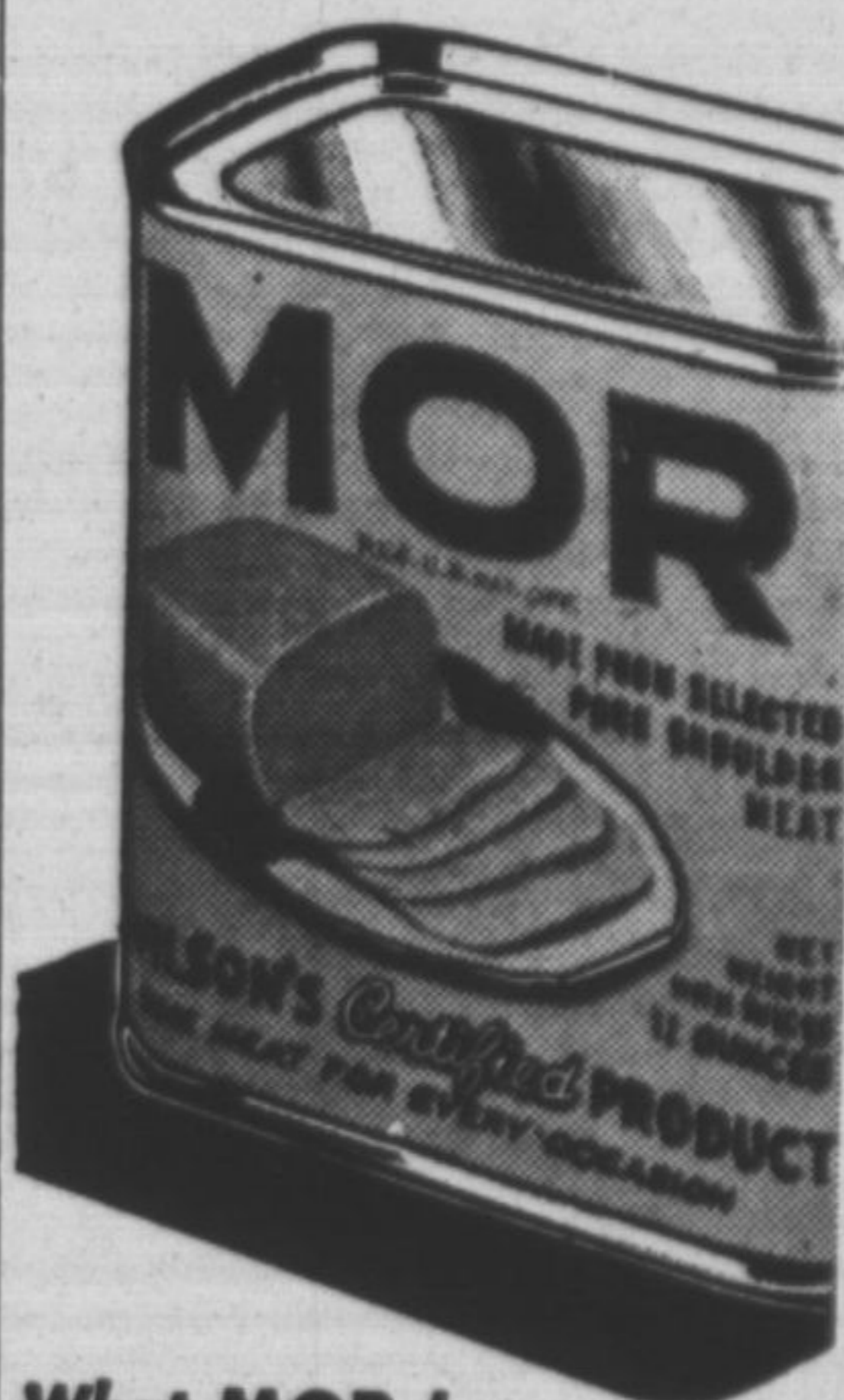
