Bonds and Stamps Offered for Sale

The United States Defense Savings Bonds and Postal Savings Stamps will be placed on sale in the Highland Park Post Office at the opening of business today Thursday, May 1, as part of the national effort to make America impregnable.

The new Defense Savings Bond is similar to the familiar "Baby Bond," of which more than five billion dollars worth have been bought by more than two and a half million Americans since 1935.

To illustrate, a \$100 face value Defense Bond may be purchased on and after May 1, for \$75. In ten years, this bond will be worth \$100. This is an increase of thirty-three and one-third percent, equal to an annual interest return of 2.9 percent compounded semi-annually. Any time after 60 days from date of purchase, the bond may be redeemed for cash, in accord with a table of redemption values printed on the face of the bond.

For the smaller investor who wants to buy a Government Bond on an easy payment plan, the post office will have a new series of Postal Savings Stamps, at 10c, 25c, 50c, \$1 and \$5. Each purchaser of any Savings Stamp higher than 10c will be given, free of charge, an attractive pocket album in which to paste his stamps until he has enough to buy a \$25 bond or one of higher denomination. Thirty million of these albums in a very attractive design are now being prepared.

Thus, even boys and girls, who save a dime or quarter, can buy the new Defense Savings Stamps, and thereby safeguard their own money and help their country.
