A Manuscript Morning on Thursday, May 8, to which the North Shore Creative Writing group are inviting their friends will close the spring term. Gardening and other activities will fill recess time until the Writers' Conference when this group will be one of the cooperating hostesses. Fall term will open in October against the Highland Park Y.W.C.A. under the leadership of Rowena Bennett, author and editor.

The mysterious author of "God at the Cross Roads," may read a chapter from this novel Thursday morning. If she is still not willing to reveal her identity Mrs. Bennett will read some excerpts. Another novel "Write Me As One" which has been adding zest to the class sessions will have a chapter presented by its hard-working author, Mrs. John Lemmon of Highland Park.

Mrs. Donald McGibeny of Lake Forest will read a group of her verse. Mr. Keith Drake of Glencoe will read a surrealist poem, Patricia Sloan of Chicago will present a group of thoughtful poems, Mrs. Cyril Bernd of Wilmette will also be in the poet-contributor group. Her children have provided Mrs. Ellsworth Jones of Winnetka with the inspiration for the verses she will read. A clever verse take-off "Rissini-Roweni" will be dramatized by Mrs. George Bowden of Ravinia.

"The Junkman Discovers America," a significant character sketch by Mrs. George Simpson of Winnetka, a controversial article by Mrs. Alonzo Streeter of Wilmette, descriptions of early Chicago days based on "Aunt Gretchen's" stories by Mrs. Donald Schick of Ravinia will represent some of the serious prose writings done by the class.

Two members who are best known by their pen names will appear "in person." Mrs. Damon Gunn of Winnetka who has recently moved to the North Shore from the East and whose stories are in nationally read fiction magazines will read "Victoria and the Army." Mrs. Horace Bennett of Evanston who writes for a new Chicago magazine as "Louise Cary" will read her amusing story of children "Pitch White."

A humorous satire on modern book reviewers will be read by Mrs. D. J. Willenkamp of Skokie. The role of the "Creative listener" which is played by several busy club women and professional people as class members will be taken by Mrs. Harry Pier of Highland Park. Program details and committee volunteers for outlining the Writers' conference will be presented by Mrs. Everett Fontaine of Highland Park. An informal get acquainted luncheon at Open House tearoom will follow the class dismissal.
