# IT TAKES ALL THREE TO MAKE A TELEPHONE

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ANSWER PROMPTLY-otherwise the person calling may think you are not there and hang up, sometimes causing you to miss a very important call.



BE SURE OF THE NUMBER before you call. If you're not quite sure, look in the directory. You may save time and avoid a "wrong" number.



BE SLOW TO HANG UP when calling. Stay at the telephone until you get an answer, a "busy signal," or until you are reasonably sure no one will answer.



SPEAK INTO THE MOUTHPIECE with your lips about one-half inch from it. This position gives the best voice transmission and the clearest reception.



SPEAK DISTINCTLY and about as loud as in ordinary conversation. Your normal tone of voice conveys your message most clearly. No need to shout.



HANG UP GENTLY after making certain the other person has finished. Banging down the receiver may cause a harsh sound in the other person's ear.

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
