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## Dr. Clark Kueber To Address League

### "Statism Or Individualism" To Be Topic of Talk Next Wednesday

Dr. Clark G. Kuebler, speaking for the annual meeting of the League of Women Voters on Wednesday, May 21, has selected for his subject, "A Choice—Statism or Individualism." Dr. Kuebler is unusually well qualified to handle this subject as he has been educated abroad as well as in this country. His alma maters include the University of Munich as well as Princeton, Northwestern university, and the University of Chicago, where he obtained his Ph.D. At present he is professor of classical languages at Northwestern, with particular emphasis on ancient law and government. He is also in charge of the tutorial program there. In the past ten years, Dr. Kuebler has visited Europe eight times, vicariously learning lessons for our democracy.

All members of the League of Women Voters are invited to listen in on the committee reports as given at the annual open board meeting, this year being held at the Public Library at 10 a.m. of the regular meeting day. This recapitulation of the year's activities will be most interesting.

The general committee includes Mr. John Guthrie of the Highland Park Co-ordinating council; Mr. Harry Bole and Mr. Harry Pertz of the high school; Mr. Al Houser who is directing public relations; Rex Andrews, chief of police; Philip E.
