The chimney on the house at 1839 Broadview avenue, was struck by lightning Thursday. The fire department was called. Slight damage resulted.

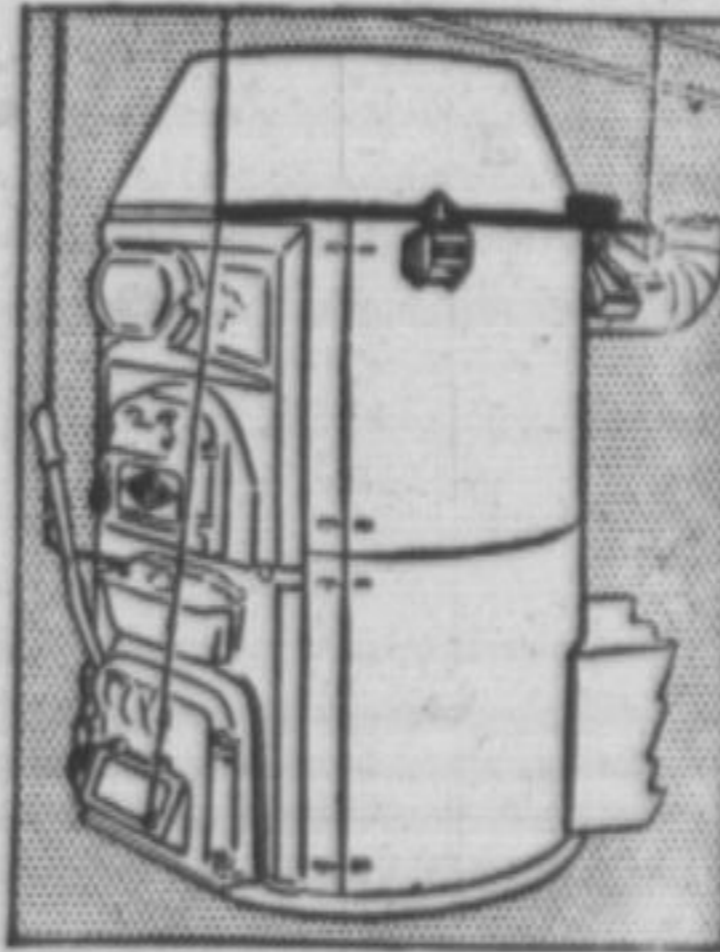
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
