### Sunset Valley Club To Participate In War Relief Tourney

The members of the Sunset Valley Golf club will take part in the One-day National Handicap Golf tournament, sponsored by the British War Relief Society, Inc., for the relief and rehabilitation of British Civilian air raid victims, according to an announcement made today by Tom Kelly, professional of the club.

The tournament which will be held on June 14 at leading golf and country clubs throughout the United States, will also enable four million golfers of America to express their appreciation for the contribution made by the people of Great Britain to the game of golf.

The event has been made possible through the cooperation of the British War Relief Society, Inc., (Winthrop W. Aldrich, president) with its 800 committees throughout the United States, and a representative committee of golf enthusiasts which Bobby Jones has organized, with H. Boardman Spalding as associate chairman.

For an entrance fee of two dollars each golfer, at every club, which signifies its willingness to cooperate, will be entitled to play on Saturday, June 14, on his club course, 18 holes of golf, and will receive one Spalding golf ball in a specially wrapped box on which the British War Relief emblem will be imprinted, as well as a greens marker symbolizing the event, which will carry the society's emblem. In addition, he will be given

an opportunity to win a prize, which will be awarded, for the low net score, at any club participating.

For this two dollar fee, every golfer who participates will have the satisfaction of knowing that he is materially helping to relieve the suffering of the stricken people of Great Britain who are having to bear the terrors of active warfare.
