Senator Wheeler To Speak Here Sunday

America First Committee Also Presents Hon. Samuel Pettengill at High School

Senator Burton K. Wheeler, vigorous non-interventionist, will return to the Chicago area next week to address an America First Committee meeting in Highland Park. Senator Wheeler will speak at the Highland Park high school auditorium on Sunday evening, June 22, at 8:30 p.m.

Appearing on the same program will be Hon. Samuel Pettengill of Indiana. Senator Wheeler will be heard over WGN at 9:30 p.m.

General Robert E. Wood, Acting National Chairman of the America First Committee, will preside at the meeting. Mrs. Philip Johnson, chairman of the Highland Park committee, and Mrs. Thomas Creigh, are directing arrangements for the rally.

Senator Wheeler was born in Hudson, Mass., in 1882. He is a direct descendent of Quaker stock that fied England in the early 17th Century because of religious persecution. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan in 1905. He was admitted to the bar in Montana in 1906 and practiced law in Butte until 1911 when he was elected to the Montana House of Representatives. In 1913 President Wilson appointed him U. S. District Attorney for Montana. In 1924 he ran as vice-presidential candidate with the Senior Lafolette on the Progressive ticket. He has been in the Senate since 1923.

Mrs. Wheeler is a member of the Washington, D. C., America First chapter. His son John is chairman of the Los Angeles chapter.

National attention has been focused on Senator Wheeler during recent months for his determined stand against participation by the United States in a foreign war. In commenting on the attempt of administration advisers to sell this unwanted war to the American people, Senator Wheeler recently said

Local Board Formed To Facilitate Aid To Service Men.

The Service Men's club of Highland Park this week became the Army-Navy Y.M.C.A., under the joint direction of the Army and Navy committee of the YMCA and a board of directors made up of Highland Park citizens.

The Service Men's club, developed out of Mayor Frank J. Ronan's committee for National Defense and sponsored by the Co-ordinating Council, has been doing the kind of work for men from Fort Sheridan and Great Lakes that is contemplated in a national way by the United Service Organizations.

This week Mayor Ronan recommended that the Service Men's club be turned over to the Army and Navy committee of the YMCA. This recommendation was endorsed and acted upon promptly by the Co-ordinating Council.
