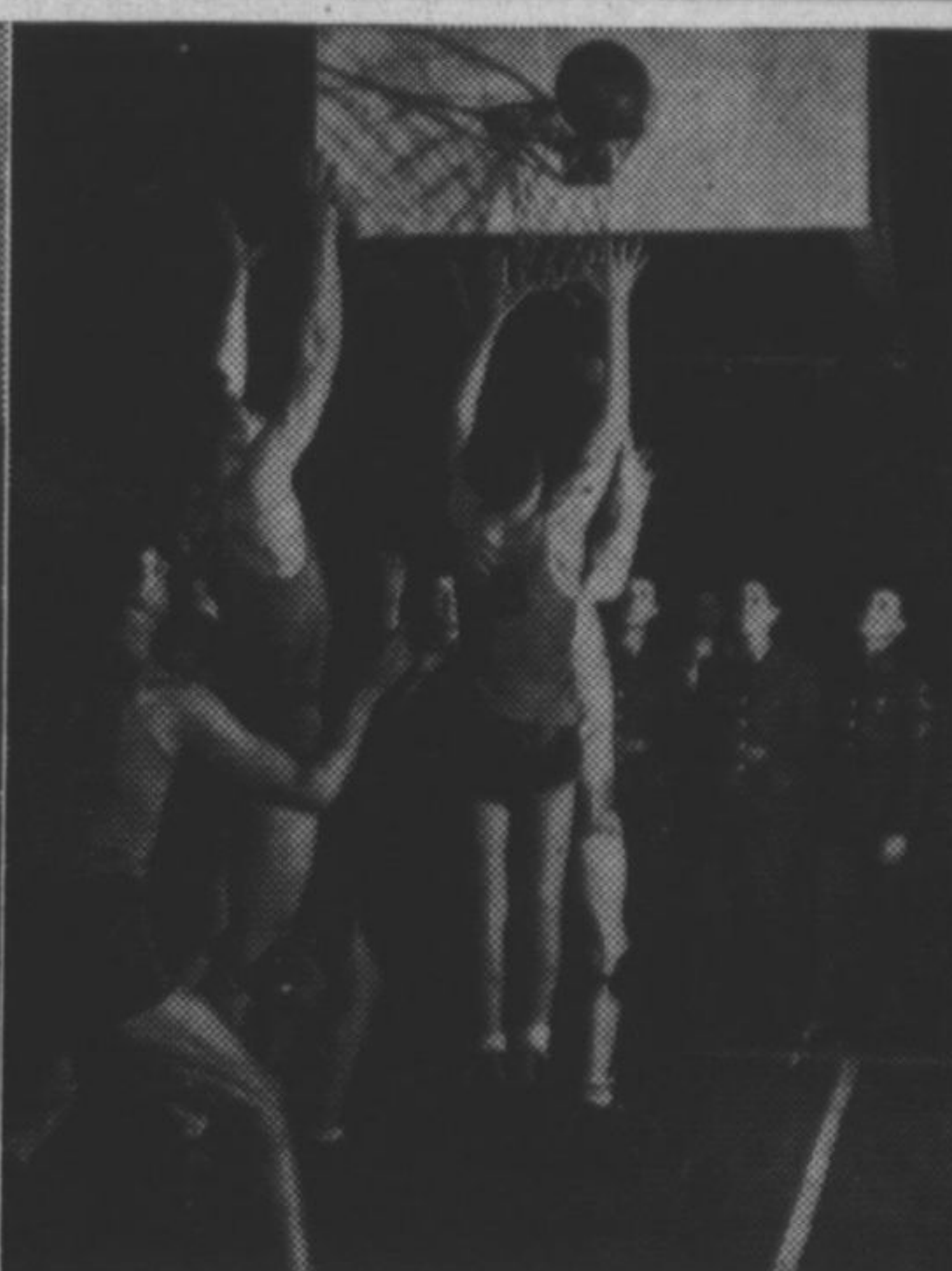
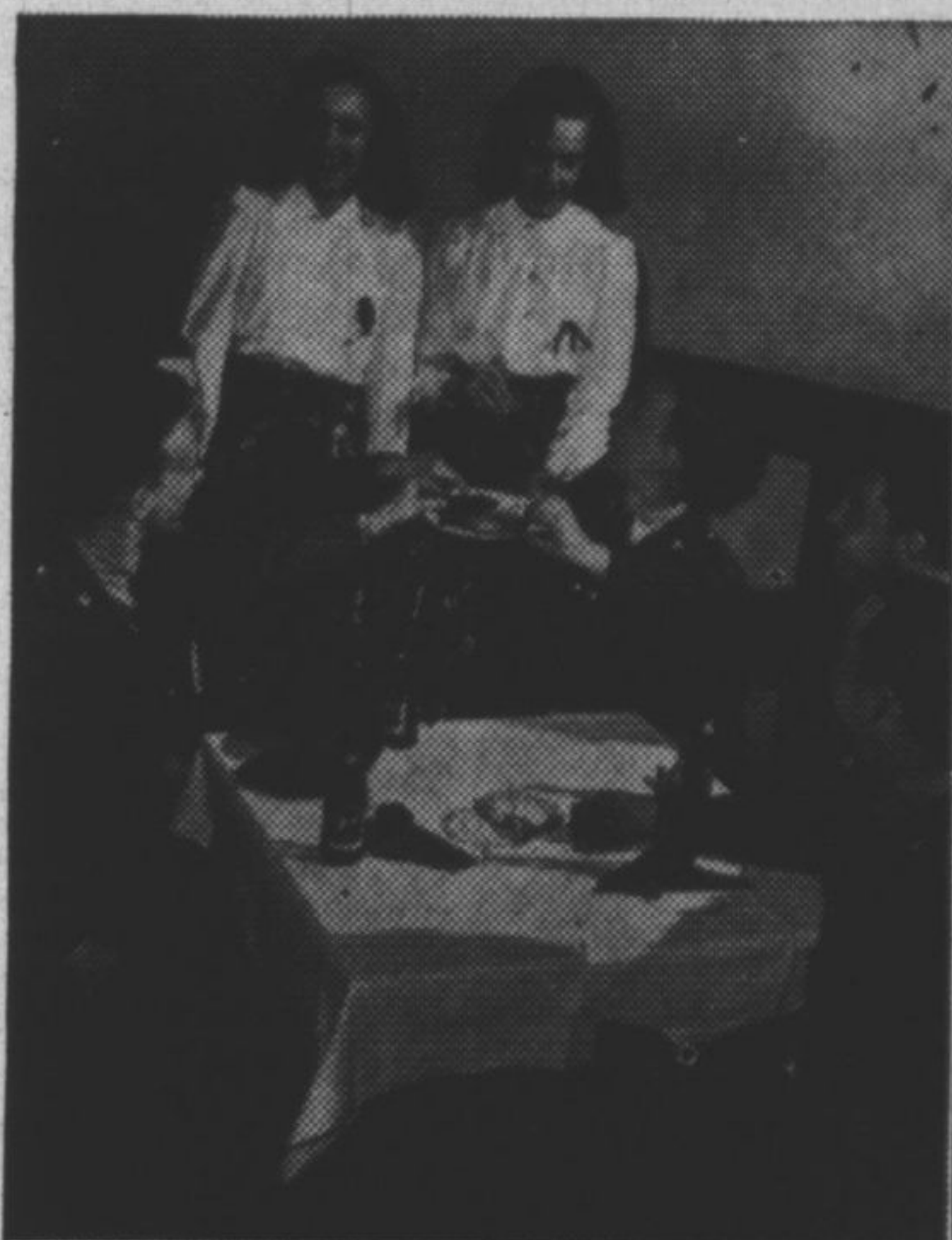


U. S. O. Seeks to Maintain Morale of Defense Forces
