Community Choral Club Elects New Officers for Coming Year

After a very successful season, the Community Choral club of Highland Park, held its annual dinner and business meeting with election of officers, on Friday, June 27, at the Community Center.

Following the repast, the retiring president, Mrs. Edgar A. Jenkins, was presented with a silver tray in the name of the members by Mrs. William Howard.

At the business meeting it was unanimously decided to change the name of the organization to the Highland Park Civic chorus. This name will signify the fact that the club definitely recognizes its responsibility in civic life and will continue to cooperate in all activities in the community.

Plans for an ambitious 1941-42 season were made, which include a fall concert, with an outstanding soloist; an operetta, and a spring concert which will give opportunity to Highland Park talent in the musical field. Season tickets to these concerts will be placed on sale soon, offering the public a saving over single ticket purchases. Rehearsals will start the first week in September. Anyone missing rehearsals while in preparation for concert will automatically forfeit membership.

Membership have been placed in four classes: family membership (more than one member per family) \$15.00; single senior active membership, \$10; single junior active (under 21), \$5; associate memberships, \$5.

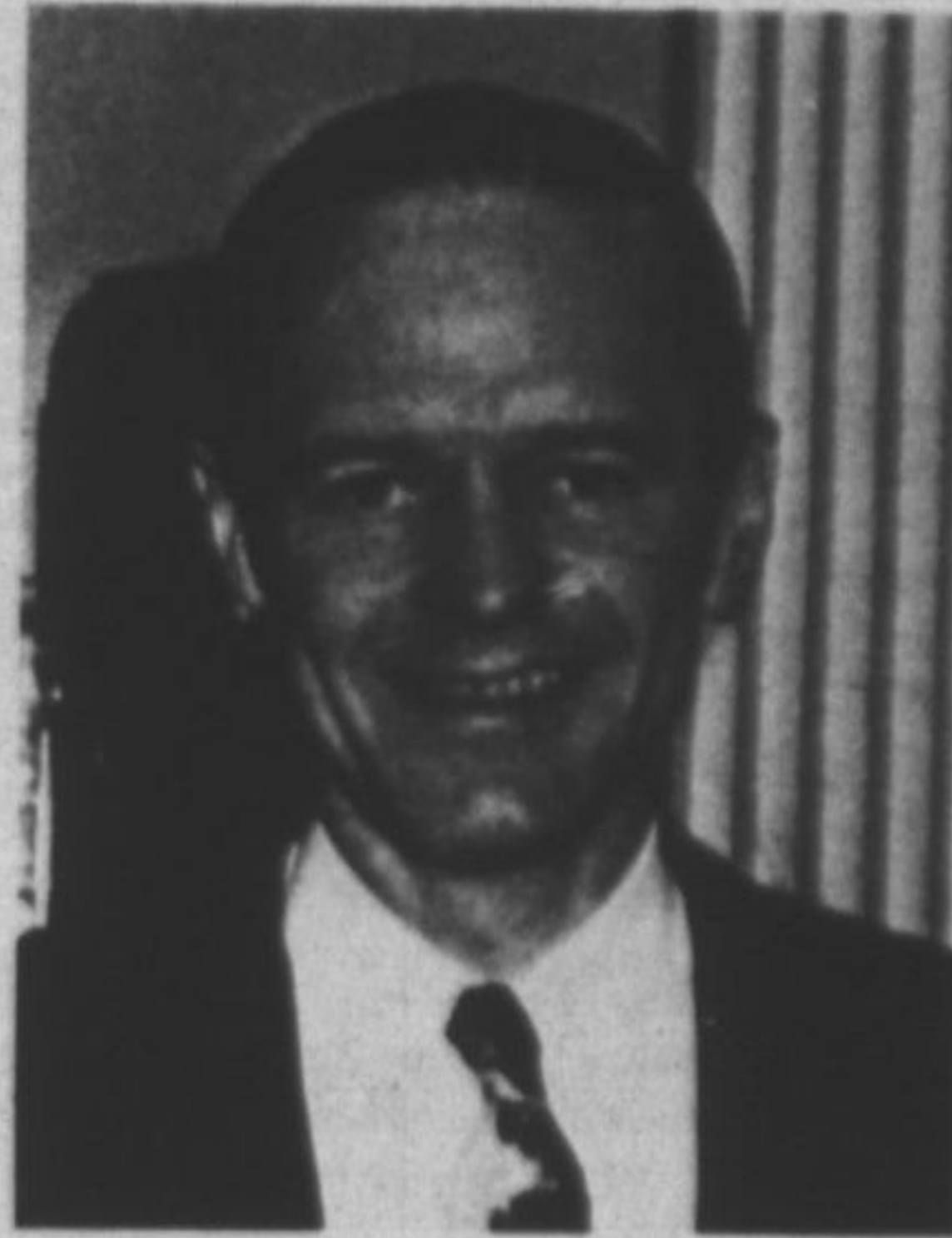
