## Flower Show In Villa Park

## Blums of Evanston Will Open Tuesday

On Tuesday morning at nine o'clock, Blums of Evanston opens the new bronze and glass doors in its new location at 616 Church Street, half a block east of its present location, and directly across the street from the Evanston Woman's Club.

As Blums-Evanston, this shop has long been known to North Shore women who have found it a most accessible spot for buying the fashions and furs that have made its parent-institution, Blums-Vogue at 630 South Michigan Avenue in Chicago, so widely known throughout the Middle West.

This Opening has been awaited with much expectation, for Blums have constructed what is recognized as a "jewel of a building" . . . raising a shop of Bedford stone, bronze, and glass in place of one of the older buildings of Evanston.

The entrance itself is striking, the soft grey of the building contrasting subtly against the tinted cement sidewalk. The latter, designed to form a functional as well as decorative base for the architecture of the building, is not only an unusual color, but is interesting in that it does away with the usual squares in the sidewalks of the average business block.

Work has progressed rapidly under the surveillance of Maher and McGrew, architects, and Erik Erb and Company, general contractors, and at this writing final touches are being made on the interior. Displays of merchandise are being installed—the famous Delman and Blum shoes in a mirrored case in an exquisitely wood-worked octagonal room—furs in a superb "interior show window" on the second floor—costume, accessories in tiny lighted cases beside the elevators and adjoining the windows.

The outstanding feature of the shop is its open-to-daylight airiness . . . Fitting rooms are day-lighted, the fur show room is flooded with north light from a tall window at the front of the shop, the second floor Salon is bright with light from tall, graceful windows veiled with filmy hangings. Even the main floor is partially lighted from without, through two of the four display windows across the front.

The interior of the shop, particularly the main floor walls, cabinets, the Georgian staircase, is a masterpiece of fine woodworking. All of the wood work and the parquet floors, have been installed by Mr. Joseph Kaszab, while Mr. David York is credited with the interior decorations—rugs, draperies, furniture, coloring and design.

The second floor Salon is a miracle of loveliness and quiet charm. Deeply carpeted, restfully lighted by an inverted dome and indirect light, supplemented by much-landed daylight, this Salon is the scene of much activity. Mannequins are scheduled to parade during the Opening Week, and on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings as well, for Open House is planned on those evenings so that husbands, too, may see and appreciate the shop which has been designed for the comfort of their wives.
