21 Men Enrolled In Chicago's Flying Squadron

More than three months before the Blackhawk squadron will go into training at the United States Naval Aviation base at Glenview, Ill., twenty-one men of the organization's quota of thirty-three cadets have been enrolled in this second all-Chicago naval flying squadron being organized by the Warren V. Woody committee of forty former World war naval aviators in the Chicago area.

This was revealed today by Lieut. Carl G. Olson of the Naval Flight Selection board for the Chicago district. The Blackhawk squadron will go into training at Glenview Nov. 30 for one month's primary instruction after which it will be transferred to one of the Annapolis of the Air bases in the south for eight months flight training. Upon completion of the course in the south, members of the Blackhawk squadron will be commissioned ensigns and assigned to combat, bombing or other flying units of the navy.

Begun Two Weeks Ago Organization of the Blackhawk squadron was begun only about two

weeks ago upon completion of the formation of Chicago's Own Squadron, the first navy flying unit to be comprised entirely of men from the Chicago area and sponsored by the Woody committee. Chicago's Own Squadron will go into training at Glenview Sept. 30.

Lieutenant Olson explained that because of the rigid requirements of those who would enroll in naval aviation, it is necessary for the Naval Flight Selection boards throughout the country to interview a great many applicants in order to meet the personnel needs of the "Eyes of the Fleet." 
