

Tax Pinch Has Started

The history-making 1941 Federal revenue bill which becomes effective today will take an estimated \$307,960,800 out of the pockets of Illinois taxpayers during the coming year, Thomas E. Fiske, executive secretary of the Taxpayers' Federation of Illinois, statewide tax economy league, reported today.

The cumulative effect of the new \$3,553,400,000 tax bill, plus Federal, state and local taxes already in existence, Fiske pointed out, will bring the total amount of taxes paid by Illinoisans to a new all-time high of \$1,407,950,000, representing an average of \$184.51 annually for each citizen, or \$2.02 a day for each family in the state.

"Starting today, Mr. Illinois Taxpayer will begin to feel the pinch of taxation without precedent in the nation's history," Fiske declared. "In addition to contributing his normal nine per cent of the Federal tax bill, supporting 15,155 local tax agencies, and paying the state sales, motor fuel, inheritance, cigarette, liquor and oil taxes and various license fees, he must now pay both new and added Federal income taxes, plus new capital stock, gift, estate, excise, and miscellaneous 'nuisance' taxes."

Today marks the start of the collection of \$846,800,000 in new and added U. S. excise taxes. Of this sum the Federation estimates Illinoisans will pay around \$64,356,800 or 7.6 per cent of the national total.

New excise taxes which Illinoisans start paying today, Fiske says, include those levied on liquor, railroad fares, cameras, radios, refrigerators, musical instruments, automobile tires, phonographs, theatre admissions, furs, toilet preparations, luggage, washing machines, light bulbs, bowling, pool, billiards, playing cards, club dues, jewelry, clocks, business machines, safe-deposit boxes, boats, cabaret and roof garden admissions, pin-ball games, electric appliances, telephone bills, and numerous other necessities and luxuries.

In the amusement field alone, new schedules will take approximately \$37,900,000 a year from Illinois "good time" seekers, Fiske predicted. Admission taxes, with exemptions removed for admissions costing less than 21 cents will extract approximately \$7,980,000 from Illinois pockets; cabaret taxes \$152,000; club dues taxes, \$212,800; billiard, bowling and pool taxes \$152,000; playing card taxes, \$76,000; electric sign taxes, \$205,200, and added U. S. liquor taxes \$13,680,000.

Fiske pointed out that approximately 4,911,000 new income taxpayers over the nation will help foot an added individual and corporate income tax bill of \$2,706,600,000 of which Illinois' share will amount to around nine per cent or approximately \$243,594,000 or \$127.68 per family.

"On the basis of income and excise taxes credited to Illinois in the past, the Federation predicts that in these combined classifications, Illinoisans will pay a total of nearly 8.7 per cent of the total bill, or close to \$307,950,800," he said.

A redeeming feature of the new legislation, Fiske said, is that taxpayers are "given reason to hope" for a lightening of the nondefense portion of Federal expenditures by the creation, in the 1941 tax bill at the instigation of Senator Harry F. Byrd, of a committee of 12 members of Congress, the secretary of the treasury and the budget director as an investigating body to study nondefense spending.

"By October 15," Fiske said, "three revised 1941 budget estimates calling for reductions in non-defense Federal spending are to be submitted by the budget director to the new Byrd committee. One will call for a one billion dollar reduction; another, one and one-half billion, and the other, two billion. On the basis of these estimates it is hoped that the Byrd committee will find it possible to save between one and two billion dollars in nondefense spending through congressional action cutting down present appropriations or by a congressional resolution requesting the President to reduce allotments to the various nondefense departments.

"The way to a new type of government economy is open," Fiske said, "but the goal is far from reached. It is up to the taxpayers of Illinois and other states of the union to support their congressmen and express their interest in this 'open sesame' to nondefense economy. Without powerful backing on the part of the public, this rare opportunity is too likely to die a natural death."

"What does South America think?" is a question frequently asked relative to the United States' plans for inter-continental cooperation. Lieutenant-Commander Carlos Fallon, a Columbian Naval Officer, will help to answer that question at the opening luncheon meeting of the League of Women Voters on Wednesday, October 5, when he talks at the Y.W.C.A. on the subject, "A Good Neighbor Speaks for Himself."

Commander Fallon is a top-notch speaker, he learned English as a child when his father was Columbian Consul in New Orleans. Moreover, much of his youth was spent on English and American merchant ships before joining the Columbian Navy. During the undeclared war between Colombia and Peru, he served in the Amazon headwaters, attaining the rank of Lieutenant Commander. Later he was appointed as a member of the Advisory Board of the Minister of War.

Commander Fallon is an Associate and Contributing Member of the National Museum of Bogota. He has done some interesting scientific work on the linguistic classification of the upper Amazon Indians. He is a student of philology, anthropology and Indian folklore and has addressed numerous university groups on these subjects.

At his own request, Commander Fallon has recently been placed on the retired list that he might establish his family in the States while his children are being educated. A splendid example of the finest South American type, Commander Fallon is distinctly a good-will envoy for Colombia. A sense of humor and natural dramatic ability gives his lecture a flair which assures it enthusiastic reception.
