

WHO'S NEWS THIS WEEK

NEW YORK. — William Cullen Bryant once engaged in a fist-fight in City Hall park with James Gordon Bennett, as the culmination of a violent political argument.

Archibald MacLeish, one of the best of contemporary American poets, and librarian of congress, has been asked to accept the administrative post of the new Washington agency of the Office of Facts and Figures.

There was quite a buzz of opposition throughout the country when Mr. MacLeish was made librarian of congress, three years ago. There was, however, some precedent for poets in government jobs and in politics.

Gen. William Haines Lytle was a poet and politician—the author of "I Am Dying, Egypt, Dying," of school-boy recitation fame. He became a colonel of the Tenth Ohio Volunteers and died leading a charge at Chickamauga.

On his graduation from Yale in 1915, he was grooved into a business career by his parents, and was surprisingly good at that too. Disregarding his parents' warnings that there were "no gold mines on Parnassus," he knocked off and made his career as a poet—on up to and beyond his winning of the \$1,000 Pulitzer prize for his poem "Conquistador" in 1933.

Those houses built like silos in the back yard of the Museum of Modern Art in New York are the development of a quite similar blend of art and utility devised by their creator, R. Buckminster Fuller, back in 1929.

He first made them to live in, and they were to be standardized, and sell for about \$3,000 apiece. His Dymaxion unit of today is not only a domicile, but it is adapted to use for defense housing, air raid shelters or troop barracks, or may be used as a beach or guest house.

Mr. Fuller is acutely aware of social change, which awareness has been one of the main inspirations of his scheming and dreaming about a world in which creativeness will outrun disaster. He pioneered airplanes as symbolic of human liberation and aspiration and took seaplane vacations, embellishing his adventure narratives with poetic adjectives of flight.

Illinois Church House Rededicated

The "Church House," located at First and Adams Streets, Springfield, Illinois, formerly the Nast Memorial Church and now the headquarters of the Illinois Church Council, has been restored and revamped to fit the needs of interchurch activities in the State of Illinois. It is to be rededicated on November 3, at 8:00 P. M.

Every effort has been made to restore the architectural lines of this beautiful, dignified, and historic building, and at the same time to have it so arranged as to give increased efficiency and a more attractive appearance. There has been a very enthusiastic response among Protestant denominational leaders, individuals, and groups to the appeal to preserve and beautify this building.

Heads of the Protestant denominations will join in an ecumenical service on November 3. Dr. Samuel McCrea Cavert of New York City, head of national cooperative church work, will be the principal speaker.

Sunday Evening Club To Hear Dr. Douglas

Lloyd Douglas, son of a Hoosier preacher, who has become the author of best selling novels and scenarios, will speak at the Sunday Evening Club in Orchestra Hall next Sunday night at eight o'clock. This will be his only public appearance in the city.

Dr. Douglas, whose first novel, "Magnificent Obsession" took the reading public by storm in 1929, has not visited the city since 1938 when he first spoke at the Sunday Evening Club. Since then two new books have been added to his list of best-sellers, "Disputed Passage" and "Dr. Hudson's Secret Journal."

At the informal meeting at seven o'clock the Club will hear Dr. Charles H. Heimsath, First Baptist Church, Evanston and the Westervelt Vocal Ensemble, a small group of distinguished singers under the direction of Louise Westervelt.

United Charities Give Free Lectures

"Social Problems Arising from the Defense Program" is proving the most popular of the free lectures offered this year to club, church and civic groups by the United Charities' Speakers' bureau, Joel D. Hunter, general superintendent of the United Charities, has announced.

The United Charities' film, "Conquering Trouble," is also available, free of charge, to club groups this year.
