## Dr. McGovern To Address Woman's Club

Dr. William McGovern, noted explorer, author, educator and lecturer will be the speaker at the evening meeting of the Ravinia Woman's Club on Wednesday, November 12th at 8 p.m.

Dr. McGovern, whose subject is "South America" is professor of political science at Northwestern University. One of the really picturesque personalities in United States education, his wanderlust, inherited from his father has carried him to the remote places of the earth. He has explored the Amazon, dug up Inca remains in Peru and penetrated the Forbidden City of Lhasa in Tibet. This adventure he has related in a book, "To Lhasa in Disguise."

At 16 years of age he studied in a monastery in Kyoto, Japan and became a Buddhist priest. He went to Oxford University for more education in 1917 and worked his way through by teaching Chinese at the University of London. He arrived in Chicago as assistant professor of anthropology of the Field Museum in 1927 and joined the faculty of Northwestern two years later.

Engaged in research in the Orient, he arrived in Tokyo at the outbreak of the Japanese war and lost no time in becoming embroiled in it. He went first to Manchukuo and while he was being toasted in champagne by Japanese official in Hsinking, his wife was arrested snapping pictures in the streets. She fumed in jail for four hours before her husband got her out. Husbands and friends are cordially invited to attend the meeting.
