NEW YORK.—It was last August that Mrs. Oreta Culp Hobby of Houston, Texas, became head of the women's division of the army's bureau of public relations.

Woman Journalist Scores for Ladies in Defense Effort She said she would organize the division to tell women what they wanted to know about the army.

Mrs. Hobby is executive vice president of the Houston Post, and hence a specialist in telling people what they want to know.

She studied law, was admitted to the bar, codified the state banking laws, was parliamentarian for the Texas assembly for several years, was assistant city attorney of Houston, wrote a book on parliamentary law called "Mr. Chairman," which is used as a text book in the schools of Louisiana and Texas.

In 1939, Mrs. Hobby was awarded the annual certificate of merit of the National Federation of Women's Press Clubs, for outstanding work in journalism.

Dr. Maurice L. Perlewis of London, England, will occupy the pulpit of North Shore Congregation Israel, Glencoe, next Sunday morning, November 9.

Dr. Perlewis is one of the most active leaders in Jewish and non-Jewish life in England and is in this country on the invitation of the American Jewish Congress. His visit to this country culminates a tour of many countries free from German aggression. He was in Rumania and Jugoslavia just before they were overrun by the Nazis.

Since the advent of Hitlerism Dr. Perlewis has given much of his time to the work of relief and reconstruction and is a member of the Executive Committee of the Central Jewish Council for Refugees. He entered the Jewish Ministry in 1921 and, at the invitation of the late Dr. Claude G. Montefiore, the famous theologian and philanthropist, became Minister of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue in London. He is now Minister of the North Western Reform Synagogue in London.

"The World After The War" will be the subject of Dr. Perlewis's sermon on November 9.
