Civic Chorus to Present Concert November 21st

The Highland Park Civic Chorus will present a Thanksgiving Concert at the Elm Place School Auditorium on Friday, November 21st at 8:15 p. m. Harold Betts will conduct, Helen Taylor will be the accompanist. Guest artist will be Madame Maria Husa, world famous Viennese soprano who will be accompanied by Max Rudolf.

Madame Maria Husa was a leading soprano of the Berlin and Vienna State Operas and made innumerable concert and operatic appearances in other cities of the continent.

Max Rudolf is a conductor, coach and teacher. He has had many successes in Europe having worked at the State Opera House in Darmstadt, conducted at the German Opera House in Prague, concert appearances with the Philharmonic Orchestra at Berlin, and five years at Gothenburg, Sweden where he conducted both orchestra and choral groups. Mr. Rudolf came to this country from Sweden last year as a refugee.

The Chorus is directed by Harold Betts brilliant young conductor and teacher who has many years experience both in concert and radio.

Miss Helen Taylor, pianist and teacher prominent for many years in music circles and director of the Columbia School of Music, is the Chorus accompanist.

Incidental solos will be sung by Miss Maria Santi, Miss Cele Scheff and Spiro Mann, Chorus members.
