

Christmas Seals Mailed Out This Week By Committee

Christmas Seals are being mailed to 22,000 homes in Lake County Monday, November 24th. The Lake County Tuberculosis Association has been working since the first of September preparing this huge mail. In addition, volunteer workers from various organizations have been generous with their services. The Girl Scouts with their leaders, folded sheets of Christmas Seals in vast numbers; the Juniors of the American Legion Auxiliary gave generously their assistance; the Phi Sigma Class of the Methodist Church helped liberally in getting material in readiness; the Lake County Salon No. 191 of the 8 at 40 worked hour after hour stuffing material into envelopes, and the Boy Scouts placed Posters advantageously throughout the County.

Mrs. Austin H. Niblack of Lake Forest was appointed Chairman of the 1941 Christmas Seal Sale. Mrs. Howard Detmer and Mrs. Francis M. Knight, will work for the Christmas Seal Sale in this community.

This year the Christmas Seal is of particular significance, as it was designed by a man who himself was a victim of tuberculosis. He saw the beam from the Lighthouse as a symbol of the knowledge given him by a Tuberculosis Association and it directed him to an early diagnosis of his case and to a sanatorium for cure. The Lake County Tuberculosis Association is the lighthouse to the victims in Lake County and the light from that beam will be as strong as the support given by the people whose help is needed to keep the light shining.

Auto Club Gives Tips To Florida Tourists

Hundreds of Illinois motorists, anxious to dodge the frigid blasts that plague the Middle West, soon will be seeking the balmy clime of Florida. Although this trip does not require intense preparation, the Illinois Automobile Club gives suggestions designed to make the drive to and the visit in the Southland resort more enjoyable.

There are frequent "cool snaps" throughout Florida and for that reason warm clothes should be taken. Motorists smoking cigarettes that are not ultra-modern makes should take a sufficient supply as many of the smaller cities between Chicago and Miami do not carry full supplies and some brands popular here are not popular in the South.

In Florida, sportsmen are able to obtain fishing tackle on a rental basis for all types of fishing. If taking your own angling equipment, 20-pound test black Nylon is recommended as it floats for a long period on top of the water, advantageous when fishing among trees, stumps and logs. Also, do not fish without a license as the areas are well patrolled by game wardens. Non-resident licenses cost \$5.50, but three-day continuous licenses, issued by county judges, may be obtained for \$1.75 each.

Red Cross Opens Emergency First Aid Station

Opening of an American Red Cross highway emergency first aid station at headquarters of the Glencoe Police and Fire Department, 675 Vernon avenue, Glencoe, has been announced by James B. Forgan, chairman of the Chicago chapter, American Red Cross.

Seventeen policemen and firemen, trained in standard and advanced Red Cross first aid, will man the station 24 hours a day, under the supervision of William F. Helke, chief of police.

Red Cross first aiders who man emergency highway first aid stations, of which there are 51 in the Chicago area, are prepared to give emergency aid to accident victims before the arrival of a physician. Each station is equipped with a first aid kit, arm and leg splints and a stretcher.

Chicago Stock Show Opening On Nov. 29

Of first importance on the Fall calendar of events to stockmen and farmers the country over is the first week of December, which this year will mark the 42nd anniversary of the continent's largest annual agricultural show, the International Live Stock Exposition and Horse Show.

The 1941 Exposition will be held from November 29 to December 6 in Chicago's huge International Amphitheatre and will overflow a large area of the adjoining Stock Yards, where hundreds of carloads of choice cattle, sheep, and swine will be displayed.

Exhibits from 37 States. Officials of the Exposition announce that entries have thus far been received from prospective exhibitors in 37 states and four Canadian provinces, the largest number of states thus far ever represented.

1942 Motor Applications Now Available

Application forms for Illinois 1942 motor vehicle license plates are now available. The 1941 plates expire Dec. 31 and the law requires that 1942 plates be displayed after that date. For motorists who have become accustomed or attached to their present license number and want to get the same combination for 1942, the Illinois Automobile Club reminds owners that the Illinois registration law makes this possible.

The deadline for filing applications for a renewal of the same registration number is midnight of Nov. 30, 1941. Car owners wishing the same number next year must file a regular vehicle registration application, accompanied by the required fee, with the Secretary of State at Springfield so as to reach that office not later than Nov. 30. On the application, under "Remarks," the applicant must state that he is applying for the same number held by him in 1940.

Until after Nov. 30 the Secretary of State cannot assign any registration number to any person, but immediately thereafter the gates are down and unclaimed numbers will become free to be assigned to any one. The demand for low or "trick" numbers is always heavy.

"NAVY INTELLIGENCE"

Is it necessary to be a high school graduate in order to enlist in the Navy?
No. Navy enlistees need not be high school graduates. All applicants will be given an examination containing approximately 100 questions. A grade of 50 per cent or better on this examination is sufficiently high to pass the Navy educational standards. However, a high school education will be valuable to the seaman during his Navy enlistment.

If I enlist in the Navy or Naval Reserve, will I be sent to a Navy Trade School?
All new recruits are sent to one of four Naval Training Stations and after a training period they may take examinations for entrance into Navy Trade Schools. Those recruits who pass their examinations with sufficiently high grades are sent to Navy Trade Schools before assignment to the fleet. While attending these schools, they will receive regular Navy pay and free schooling valued at \$1500.

What is the greatest possible pay I can expect to earn during my first term of enlistment?
It is possible to earn as much as

\$126 a month by the end of your first term of enlistment, and remember that your lodging, medical and dental care are all supplied free.

After I have served my term of enlistment, what benefits do I get for re-enlistment?
Depending on your rate and length of service, you can get a cash bonus up to \$600 plus 30 days leave with pay.

What does the term "ash can" mean in the Navy?
An "ash can" is a slang term applied to the depth charge used to combat submarines. The average "ash can" is a container filled with approximately 200 pounds of T.N.T. and can be dropped overboard from a ship and so controlled, as to explode at depths ranging from 36 to 300 feet. These are generally carried by the fast ships in the fleet, as a boat dropping a charge regulated to explode at 70 feet depth must move away from the explosion area at a speed of 25 knots or more. These "ash cans" are either rolled off the stern or shot from "y-guns" which have one right and one left simultaneous.
