estimate the total to be reached by the Special Gifts Committee through normal solicitation would reach a total of more than \$26,000, or \$2,000 short of the Special Gifts quota. Mr. George pointed out that this shortage was largely due to a decrease in the amount \$1,989 made by Special Gifts subscribers last year and the removal from the City of Special Gift subscribers who gave a total of \$715 a year ago.

Chest Falls Short

It was due to these reports made by the campaign chairmen indicating that the Chest would fall short of its goal by some \$2500 if no special effort was made to reach the goal that the board of directors took the action it did in authorizing the campaign chairmen and officers of the board to make a special appeal for additional support from subscribers.

President Garnett stated that the special appeal would be made at once, and he urged that all Chest supporters respond to the best of their ability to enable the Chest to again successfully reach its goal, a task at which he stated the community had not failed the Chest as yet in the seven years of its existence. Mr. Garnett particularly urged all citizens who had not responded to the volunteer workers with a subscription to do so at once to facilitate the work of the campaign committee and to ease the burden they have been carrying for more than a month.
