United Choirs To Present The Messiah

The traditional Christmas performance of THE MESSIAH will be given by the United Choirs of New First Congregational Church on Sunday evening, December 21, at eight o'clock under the direction of Paul Vernon, who succeeds George L. Tenney as Director of Music at New First.

Soloists will be Margaret Lester, soprano, Lucy Hartman Delano, contralto, Walter Boydston, tenor, and Luke Gask, bass, with Dr. William Lester at the organ. The New First Choirs will be augmented for this performance by members of the Austin

Choral Club, the combined forces numbering two hundred or more singers. Especial interest is attached to this year's presentation of THE MESSIAH, both because it is the two hundredth anniversary of the creation of this immortal masterpiece by George Frederick Handel, and because it will be the first occasion on which Mr. Vernon will direct the United Chorus in the special musical events for which New First Church has been famous for 35 years.

On Friday evening, December 19, a reception will be tendered Paul Vernon; diner at 6:15 will be followed by a Christmas party.

A trial black-out to hatred, greed and war will take place Sunday in Orchestra Hall from 7 to 9 during the Christmas service of the Chicago Sunday Evening Club. Youth and old age will join in a joyous festival of old and new carols and a deeper consideration of the Christmas prayer for peace and goodwill on earth.

A chorus of 150 youngsters from all parts of the city, members of the Civic Music Children's Association, will join with the choir and soloists of the Sunday Evening Club at the seven o'clock meeting. The message of the carol, "Star of wonder, star of light, guide us to thy perfect Light" will sound the theme of their program.

The Christmas address at the main meeting at eight will be given by Bishop G. Ashton Oldham, "The Relevance of Christmas," and will be introduced by Clifford W. Barnes, president of the Club. Colonel Robert G. Peck, prominent Episcopal layman, will read the Christmas story from the Bible.

Singing with the choir of 125 in the Christmas song service during the eight o'clock meeting are Louisa Hoe, Virginia Auyer, Mark Love and Charles Sears.

H. P. Archery Club Is State Leader

Tournaments will be held with other Archery Clubs throughout the season. A business meeting is held once a month.

Sunday afternoons the range is open from 2:30 to 5 o'clock for practice shooting. Visitors are welcome both Thursday nights, and Sunday afternoons.

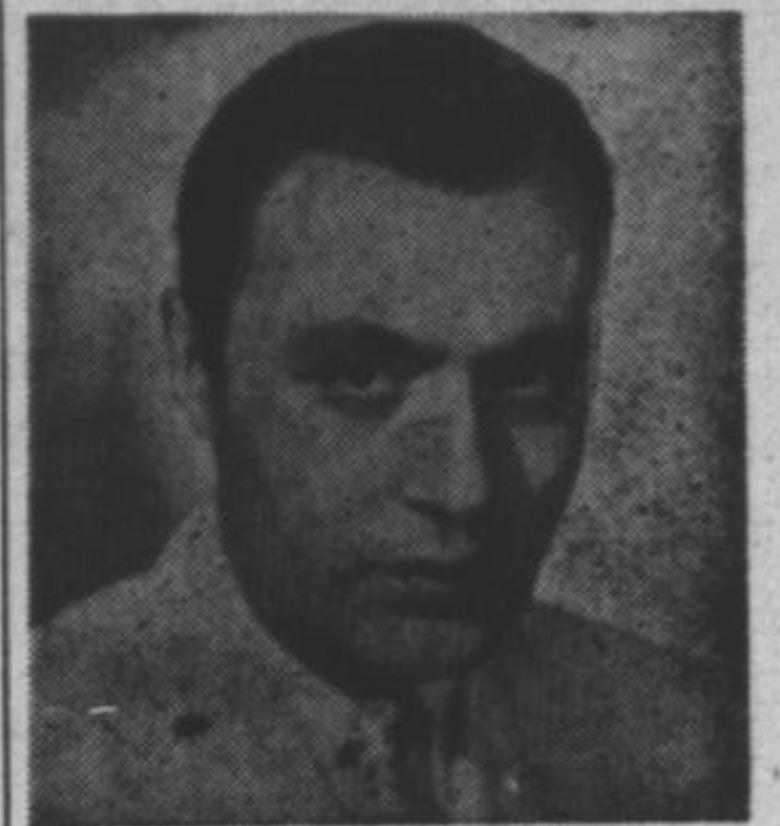
Memberships are open for those interested.
