Paralysis Drive Last 2 Weeks In January

The Fight Against Infantile Paralysis drive being waged throughout the nation during the last two weeks in January has a special significance for citizens of Lake County.

29 cases have been reported in the county during the past ten years, according to an announcement from the State Department of Public Health. In the entire state there were 359 cases in 1941 as compared with 564 cases in 1940 and 192 cases in 1939. According to health authorities, there is no way of predicting the extent of this disease for this year.

Secretary of State Edward J. Hughes, who is chairman of the drive in Illinois, has announced that 50 per cent of the funds raised in each county in the drive to combat infantile paralysis will remain in the county for the care of local cases; 50 per cent will go to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis with headquarters in New York.

For a number of years this organization has been directing the nation-wide fight against poliomyelitis. It is sponsoring scientific research to determine the causes, and methods of cure; it is assisting in first-aid during infantile paralysis epidemics, and is serving to acquaint directors and parents with the latest scientific knowledge of proper care. The Foundation has also established orthopedic centers, hospitals, and clinics.

Joseph P. Daly, Waukegan, has accepted chairmanship of the drive in this county. A local committee will be appointed to assist in the plans. The activities in each county will depend on the plans of the committee and the cooperation of local civic groups, church organizations, etc.

Secretary of State Hughes has suggested to local drive chairmen that activities be arranged for the last two weeks in January, including small parties in homes, bazaars, benefit sports events such as basketball games, benefit movies, Miles of dimes and the use of coin collectors placed in stores and public buildings.

Register At The Community Center For Defense Work

The Civilian Defense Volunteer Office has been open this past week at the Highland Park Community Center which is located at the corner of Greenway Road and Central Avenue.

Many citizens of all ages and qualifications have already registered, but this community needs many more defense volunteers in order to be properly prepared in the present emergency.

Mayor Ronan has stated that practice blackouts will begin in the near future. Before that time air raid wardens for each section of the city must be appointed and trained.

Citizens desiring training in motor corps, auto mechanics, rifle instruction, first aid, home nursing and other useful defense fields are to be given the opportunity to enroll in these courses soon.

But, first they must register at the Civilian Defense Volunteer Office which is open weekdays from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m., evenings from 7 until 9 and Sundays from 2 until 5.

Through this registration the office will have at its disposal a valuable record of potential power. REGISTER NOW.
