

Music Club Will Present N. Milstein

Nathan Milstein, world famed violinist, will appear on the third concert of the Eighteenth season in the artist recital series sponsored by the Winnetka Music club at New Trier high school auditorium, at 8:30 o'clock Monday evening. Milstein was born in Odessa December 31, 1904 and is now becoming an American citizen. He is ranked among the three greatest violinists. Such is the world-wide popularity of Nathan Milstein that in the course



of each season he gives about 100 appearances. He was first introduced here in 1929 by Leopold Stokowski and the Philadelphia Orchestra, he has made twelve consecutive tours of this country. He is an especial favorite of symphony orchestra conductors. Milstein has made four tours of South America.

Library Training Course For Gray Ladies at Presbyterian Hospital

Through the cooperation of the Woman's Board of Presbyterian Hospital, a library training course for Red Cross Gray Lady volunteers is to be given under the direction of Miss Selma Lindem, librarian at Presbyterian Hospital, with Mrs. Philip F. W. Peck, co-chairman of the Board's library committee, in charge of the project. The course, which began on Wednesday, Jan. 21, is the first designed to prepare volunteers for library work in hospitals and at Army and Navy posts.

It consists of weekly lectures on various phases of hospital library work, including technique, book selection, psychology, points of view of doctor and superintendent, work with children. The talk will be followed later on by apprentice work under Miss Lindem and Mrs. Peck in the wards and private pavilion of Presbyterian Hospital. When the Gray Ladies are considered proficient as library workers, they will be graduated and will be available for service wherever assigned by the Red Cross.

The 19 women comprising the class were selected by Miss Lindem and Mrs. Peck from a larger group who reported at Red Cross headquarters for interviews.

Miss Selma Lindem is the only full-time professional librarian employed in any Chicago hospital and because of her outstanding record there since 1929, was borrowed for six months two years ago to assist in setting up a Junior League project in hospitals of New York City. Mrs. Peck has done successful volunteer work under Miss Lindem from time to time for several years.

The Presbyterian Hospital Library is one of the major activities supported by the hospital Woman's Board.

For their first lecture on Wednesday morning, the group went to Children's Memorial Hospital, where they were addressed by Dr. Byrd Arnold Smith, M. A., clinical psychologist at that hospital, on the subject of personality traits.
