Don Cossack Chorus Concert February 9 at Civic Opera House

Chicago's 97,000 Russians are strongly united behind a drive to raise money to send medical supplies to the suffering Russians.

The United Russian-American committee, headed by John F. Erin, president, has been pledged the cooperation of thirty-six separate organizations throughout the city. Churches, schools, women's clubs, and social groups are supporting the drive. Party differences have been forgotten by the city's Russians in their determination to send aid to their countrymen.

Climax of the drive will be the concert of the General Platoff Don Cossack Chorus, at the Civic Opera House on Monday evening, February 9. The concert is being given under the auspices of the United Russian-American Committee, and all the profits will be turned over by the committee to Russian War Relief.

A capacity audience is expected for the Don Cossack concert. The chorus, directed by the famous Russian officer, N. Kostrukoff, has given over 4,000 concerts on six continents in the last fifteen years.

Barton Mumaw To Give Dance Recital Feb. 22

Barton Mumaw, the first young American artist, in the dance field, to distinguish himself in our native idiom, will give a dance recital at the Great Northern Theatre on Sunday afternoon February 22nd at 3:30 under the concert management of Bertha Ott.

In Mr. Mumaw's recital he gives an exciting and vigorous portrayal of life in its contrasting beauties and tragedies. He also gives to his audiences, not only his deep sense of responsibility as an artist, in which he displays technical skill, but his rapid forging ahead for something that is genuinely American. In his New York recital, the program was so well coordinated it placed him above his contemporaries. He has a fine physique and his movements are pure grace. Jess Meeker, his accompanist, composed much of the music that is interpretative of Mr. Mumaw's original ideas.
