**First Aid Lecture And Demonstration Given By Haines**

Donald Haines, of the Public Service company, was the speaker last night before the Lake County Dental Defense group meeting held at Victory Memorial hospital. Last night's lecture and demonstration covered the many phases of resuscitation following collapse due to electrical shock, asphyxiation, drowning, etc.

Forty-one dentists participated in this meeting and took full advantage of an extensive question and answer period following the demonstrations.

**REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LESSON-SERMON**

"Substance" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, March 15th.

The Golden Text was, "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11: 1).

**Do You Like "Carpet Bedding"?**

Just for the novelty of it, you might like to try your hand at some carpet bedding, a rather old-fashioned art that used to be used in public areas a great deal and is still used in some cemeteries and parks. Perhaps you have often wondered just what plants were used for the various color effects in working out designs and words.

Annuals are ordinarily used. Here are suggested plants to use:  
 For red and green: Use red and green forms of alternanthera.\*

For white: Use sweet alyssum; or some experts in carpet bedding prefer a non-flowering plant such as Centaurea candidissima (dusty miller).

For yellow: Pyrethrum aureum.xx  
 For blue: Ageratum.

If alyssum is used for white, then for other colors use some of the taller growing plants:

For red: Achyranthus brilliantissima.\*

For green: Green and yellow variegated achyranthus\* (not a very good green, however, as it inclines more toward yellow).

For yellow: Yellow coleus.\*

For blue: Ageratum.

Set only the plants forming the edge of any design in rows. In filling in central areas place the plants irregularly so no definite lines are discernible in the planting.

Set the plants 2 to 2½ inches apart. This may vary somewhat, according to size of plants transplanted. For an immediate effect, set so that the plants just touch each other. The plants can be set farther apart if an immediate effect is not essential. Beds must be kept trimmed thruout the entire season if they are to be attractive. When the pyrethrum are trimmed, gather up all the prunings to avoid mold and rot.

Note: I find that very few seed and nursery catalogs list these bedding plants. Plants marked (\*) are listed by Good & Reese, Inc., Springfield, Ohio; and The McGregor Bros. Co., Springfield, Ohio. Plants marked (xx) are listed by Vaughan's Seed Store, 601 West Jackson Blvd., Chicago, Illinois.

**7 ways to save money on your home laundry**



Even "old hands" at home laundry, with the most modern equipment, are now remembering ways of saving money that suddenly have become important.

Check up on your own laundry method—faithfully observe these seven points. Your expense will be less—and your laundry perhaps even whiter!



- 1 Few clothes need boiling.**  
 Proper laundry methods will keep clothes white without boiling, thus saving the hidden costs in this extra step. Boil only baby clothes, handkerchiefs, and sickroom linens.
- 2 Learn exactly how much is a tubful.**  
 Too many clothes slow down the water action and drag on the motor, too few clothes increase the number of tubfuls. A 7 to 12 minute washer run is usually long enough.
- 3 Watch the water level.**  
 Water above the marked water level may strain the motor or overflow into the gears.
- 4 Always loosen wringer tension.**  
 When wringer is not in use, tension should be released to avoid flat spots on rubber rollers.
- 5 Lubricate every 6 months.**  
 Read direction sheet carefully, lubricate gears and motor at least twice a year.
- 6 Dampen clothes carefully.**  
 An even distribution of moisture means faster ironing. Use bottle with perforated metal top, sprinkle with warm water (spreads more evenly).
- 7 Study fine fabrics.**  
 Lengthen the life of your clothes by learning the special methods of laundering silks and woolsens. These facts can be obtained from our Home Service Department.
