## Edith Montlack Give Concert at Civic Opera House

Edith Montlack, pianist, will give her first Chicago performance in the Civic Theatre on Sunday afternoon, April 19th, at 3:30 p. m. For several years she has been known to concert audiences as a brilliant pianist of distinction. In New York City Edith Montlack has given many piano recitals and appeared on innumerable radio programs. She has received recognition as a fine pianist because of the depth of her interpretation, the rich quality of her tone, and her excellent technique. Edith Montlack's background indicates the thoroughness of her training. As a result of winning a competitive scholarship, she had the privilege of studying under the late Professor William L. Calhoun for eight years. Following this, she won another competitive scholarship at the Master Institute of United Arts, and continued her studies with the prominent Russian pedagogue, Sina Lichtmann, who was formerly assistant to Leopold Godowsky.

## Fray-Braggiotti Piano Recital April Twelfth

Bertha Ott Concert Management is presenting Jacques Fray and Mario Braggiotti in a two piano recital, at the Eighth Street Theatre, on Sunday afternoon April 12th at 4 o'clock.

Fray and Braggiotti are internationally famous. They are both students of the French Conservatory, and active members of the Parisian "avant-garde" of music, these artists, met, merged their pianos, and began building a repertoire from their manuscripts of their own transcriptions. Here, in the young field of duo-pianism, they felt, was a new medium through which all music could be reflected. Hence these two artists emerged with a new style of pianism which brought them immediate recognition.

Fray and Braggiotti select their programs for recital, radio and symphony appearances from an entirely original two-piano library of their own.

## N. U. Tennis Schedules Is Announced

Northwestern's hopes for a successful tennis season will depend greatly on the rate of recovery of Bobby Jake, sophomore star, who received a back injury in basketball. Jake, who holds the Wisconsin singles championship, is still in a cast but is expected to be available for a portion of the nine match schedule which opens with Wisconsin at Evanston on April 24th.

Coach Paul Bennett will build the squad around Capt. Seymour Greenberg, who has won the Big Ten singles championship for the past two years. Greenberg played a leading role on the Wildcats' championship team of 1940. The team finished second in the conference last year.

In addition to Greenberg, Northwestern will have two lettermen returning from last year's squad. They are Harrie Hall, a senior, who has won two letters, and Bob Goodkind, a junior. This trio will hold down the first three positions until Jake is able to join the team. The latter will play in the No. 2 spot.

The other positions will be filled by Don Skinrod, a reserve from last year, and two sophomores, Byron Gordon of Chicago, and Marvin Doherty of Cedar Rapids, Ia.

## Boxing Returns To The Stadium April Tenth

Big time boxing returns to the Chicago Stadium after an absence of several months when Melio Bettina, the former light heavyweight champion, now a full fledged heavyweight meets a rejuvenated Booker Beckwith in the 16 round main go of a Bill Rand staged show in the "Big House" on Friday night, April 10.

Beckwith who has only had one fight this season, and has been on a physical build up campaign for the past several weeks, will find in Bettina the roughest foe he has been called upon to face. Even though the Gary dynamiter will have the edge in speed and cleverness he'll be battling a rugged unorthodox southpaw who has won most of his successes, including his last seven fights, by carrying the battle to the opposition all the time.

Bettina is bound to be at the height of his form for the fight. At the present time he's drilling in Philadelphia for a bout with Gus Dorazio on Monday, March 30, and he's a 5 to 1 shot to take the Philly trial horse.

A semi-windup that would deserve top rating on most cards will provide an added attraction for the fight. Tony Motisi, who is handled by Paddy Kane, veteran CYO trainer and coach, and who fights under the CYO banner is scheduled to clash with the sturdy Harry Teaney of Cleveland in a ten rounder. Teaney, a sensation as a heavy lightweight meets a welter in Motisi and Tony will likely rank as favorite because of his recent victory over Fritz Zivic. Motisi, called the Tony Zale of the welters because of his rise to stardom after a long tough grind that had many setbacks, is the newest hero around these parts. He was matched with Teaney as the main attraction for the Coliseum when that show was cancelled for the Stadium affair.

## Northwestern Lists 1942 Football Games

Northwestern university's 1942 football schedule is the largest that the Wildcats have played since 1905, when the card consisted of 11 games. Following the '05 season, Northwestern dropped football for two years, returning in 1908 with a four-game schedule. Faculty permission to increase the number of games was granted during ensuing years until an eight-game schedule was established in 1923. The schedule remained at that figure until this year when the faculty athletic committee gave permission to play two service teams in addition to the regular eight games. 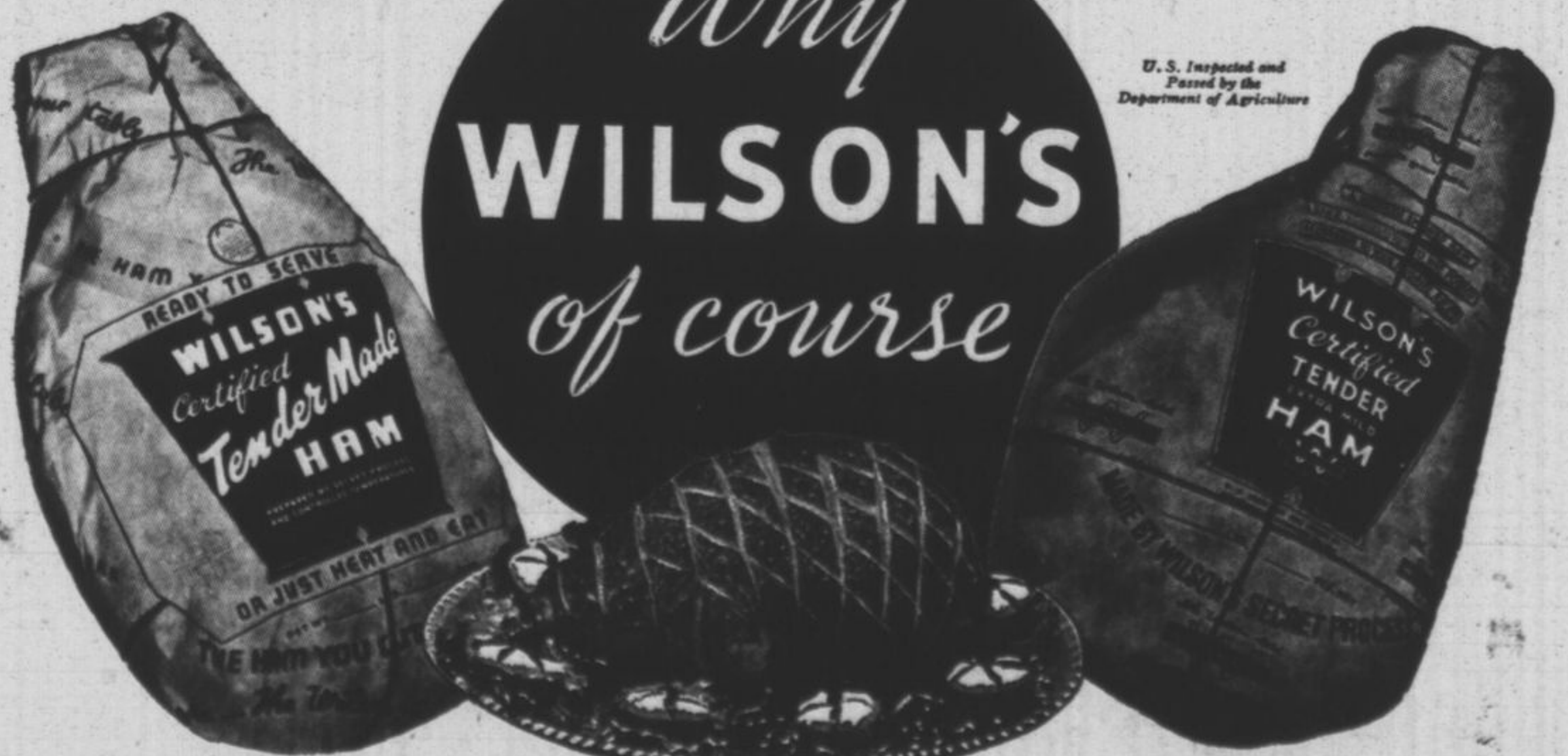
