

**Bronze Plaque Honoring Service Men To Be Dedicated**

William E. Salyards, Jr., Highland Park, an employee of the Crowe Name Plate Manufacturing company, Chicago, has made and presented to the Dumaresq Spencer Post of the American Legion, a large bronze plaque, under which will be inscribed the names of all Highland Park men in the services of our country.

A picture of Abraham Lincoln is etched on one side of the plaque and the bust of George Washington on the other side. An eagle is on the top half of the plaque under which this inscription appears: "In tribute we inscribe hereon the names of those from our community whom we honor for services in the defense of our Country."

The plaque is attached to a walnut panel, which will also hold the bronze plates with the name inscription. It will be dedicated on Memorial day, May 30.

**Maj. Bruce Parsons To Report for Military Service**

Bruce Parsons, General Agent, at One North La Salle, for the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company, received orders to report for duty April 2nd, and is currently assigned to staff duty with 6th corps area, with Headquarters in the Post Office Building.

Parsons served as Captain of Field Artillery in the first World War. He left college when a junior at Iowa State, where he was cadet-major, to enter an Officer's Training Camp, and came out a Captain at the age of 22.

Following the war, during which Parsons served in France for six months, he returned to Iowa State to receive his degree in Mechanical Engineering, and continued his commission in the Officer's Reserve Corps. He frequently attended summer camps for two weeks training period, as a result of which he was promoted to the rank of Major, which he now holds. He commanded the 404th Field Artillery for a few years, prior to being appointed General Agent in 1937, at which time he asked to be released for this duty inasmuch as he could not devote sufficient time to this command.

Currently, Major Parsons will live in residence in Highland Park, where he and Mrs. Parsons and their four sons, Don, Jim, Topper and Bruce II, reside at 915 Ridgewood Drive.
