The complete line-up of distinguished conductors and soloists who will appear at the seventh Ravinia Festival was announced this week by the Ravinia Committee.

Conductors for the six weeks of concerts by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra will be Dimitri Mitropoulos, George Szell, Eugene Ormandy, Artur Rodzinski, and Pierre Monteux. Appearing as soloists will be Artur Schnabel, famed pianist; Emanuel Feuermann, 'cellist; Josef Szigeti, violinist; and at one special concert Feuermann and Szigeti will join forces for a performance of the Brahms Double Concerto. The Budapest String Quartet will play four concerts in a week of chamber music beginning Tuesday, August 11.

The Festival will open on Tuesday evening, June 30, with the orchestra playing under Mitropoulos, noted Greek conductor of the Minneapolis Symphony, making his Ravinia debut. Following last year's pattern, Ravinia concerts will be on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday evenings, and on Sunday afternoons.

The second and third weeks will bring back to the Ravinia podium the Hungarian George Szell, whose appearance last year was one of the Festival's highlights.

Schnabel will be Szell's soloist on Saturday and Sunday, July 11 and 12, and again on Tuesday and Thursday, July 14 and 16, in four different piano concertos.

Returning for his third Ravinia engagement, Eugene Ormandy, conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, will take the baton for the fourth week, with Feuermann appearing as 'cello soloist on Tuesday, July 21. On Saturday, July 25, Josef Szigeti will join Feuermann for the first Ravinia performance of the Brahms Concerto for Violin and 'Cello.

Szigeti will stay over for the fifth week, appearing as soloist on Tuesday, July 28, under the baton of Artur Rodzinski, the Cleveland Orchestra's regular conductor, who will conduct during the fifth week in his fourth Ravinia engagement.

Pierre Monteux, the San Francisco Symphony's director, who was most successful last season, returns to again conduct Ravinia's final week of Symphony concerts.

The curtain has already gone up on the all-important campaign for private subscription to the Ravinia Guaranty Fund, and public participation in making Ravinia "music under the stars" possible will come early with the annual sale of money-saving coupon books.
